



'No going back' by Lyndon Stacey.



This is the first book in a new mystery series about 'a man and his dog', with a horse racing slant.

Daniel Whelan, a ten year veteran of the Police force, was frozen out by his fellow workers when he disclosed information about the loss of evidence. Now he has one 'true' companion - Taz, a German shepherd, retired Police dog, who plays a major role in the drama.

Set around Dartmoor, Daniel is called one day by a 'father' who wants him to find his daughters who he thinks have got lost on the Moor. The plot thickens, when after one 'daughter' is found, and then the other eventually tells her story and Daniel is put into danger.


An enjoyable read, and although I found discrepancies in the plot, this comes highly recommended to those who like a thriller.

Your Stars Tonight.

"It is the Yuletide season" enthuses the steamed dietor as she bedecks her lap top with a string of Christmas lights. Her eyes glisten as she continues, "Just imagine - Taff will be selling hot chestnuts from a brazier outside Chickpea cottage, the Ship and the Anchor will overflow with Christmas cheer, the youth of Ugborough emerge from the Christmas Bazaar laden with presents lovingly bought for their parents and from high in the church tower the choir will lift their voices to the star spangled heavens". I decide to take a reality check down the garden and am relieved to find it has stopped drizzling.

Jupiter still blazes high in the southern sky but each night it is slighter lower and closer to the western horizon - by April it will be gone. But rising in the east just after dark is my old friend Orion the Hunter. By midnight he is striding across the heavens well above the southern skyline. His belt of three stars is unmistakeable and once seen then the rest of the shape of shoulder, feet and arms all seem to fall into place. The brain tries to make sense of the random scatter of stars and then sees an imagined reality, just as shadows on the wall or patterns on the wallpaper take on a life of their own - and the blobs of coloured paint become Monet's Water Lilies. Once our ancestors had seen the Hunter then some of the other patterns must have come easily - Taurus the bull charging towards Orion, the saucepan shape of the Plough, Leo, and the W of Cassiopeia. I must admit that I do not have the imagination (and perhaps the time watching my flocks by night) to distinguish constellations such as Aries the Ram and Pisces the Fish - they still look like a random scatter of stars.

Through the binoculars Jupiter is a magnificent sight, but as always the most precious of celestial Christmas gifts is Orion's nebula - that little fuzzy patch in the middle of Orion's dagger hanging from his belt - which is revealed as a wondrous cloud of glowing interstellar gas bedecked with stars.

Refreshed I return to the warmth of the Ugborough Parish Newsletter office. The steamed dietor eyes me up and remarks "I suppose you will do at a pinch provided we make the grotto fairly dark and you don't say anything to spoil the aura of seasonal jollity" Then she exclaims " Of course - you keep quiet and Sharon can do the voice over."

The Land Society presented its enlightened proposals at the start of the November Parish Council Meeting. The aim of this non profit organisation is to roll out Community Land Trusts in rural areas where housing is unaffordable – like our Parish. House prices are kept low through a combination of using land not earmarked for development, and by developing eco houses using self-builders. The design of the eco houses is fascinating, with rammed earth flooring, gabion foundations, straw bale walls and sheep's wool insulation. Materials are supplied at each stage and the self-builders attend a training course of one evening a week at South Devon College over 12 months. The completed houses are then part-owned by the self-builders, with a Community Land Trust retaining ownership of the balance. The small scale developments of 4-5 houses provide affordable housing, cement communities and re-skill locals.

<u>Superfast Broadband</u> has reached Ivybridge, but Ugborough residents were concerned that it had bypassed their village. However, County Cllr Mumford set minds at rest: The Devon & Somerset Local Broadband Plan was due to run from Autumn next year to 2015 and would provide superfast broadband to 85% of rural Devon, targeting villages like Ugborough. In addition, BT is upgrading the capacity of its existing copper lines. For more information, look at www.connectingdevonandsomerset.co.uk - so all that is needed is a bit of patience....

Bittaford and Ugborough Play Areas and their renovation were discussed at the meeting, following further discussions with playground providers. Bittaford residents had been concerned that equipment previously provided by them may be scrapped, so the intention now is to renovate the existing play equipment and replace a couple of pieces which were beyond redemption. In Ugborough, the Donkey Lane play area would retain its swings, but the existing climbing frame would be replaced. The Parish Council hopes to provide picnic benches in both play areas, with the Bittaford picnic bench displaying a plaque similar to that on the stolen seat.

Ice and snow emergency planning was finalised at the meeting. Snow warden Ed Johns will be gritting the lanes from Wrangaton Post Office to Marwood Cross, Moorhaven and Bittaford Hill; and from Bittaford to Ugborough. These routes would then connect to the roads gritted by DCC. To carry out the gritting, the Parish Council is buying a towable grit spreader, using grant

funding from DCC. Ed has asked for volunteers to form snow-digging teams (night and day) in the event of a heavy fall - if you are able to help, please contact him on 01752 892674, 07970757755 or eddjohns@hotmail.co.uk. Suggestions are also invited for footpaths to be gritted, where access is needed to residents with particular needs. A word of caution - parishioners should still take care, as no undertaking is given that the roads may not be slippery.

<u>Japanese Knotweed and Himalayan Balsam</u> are invading our lanes, and Councillors are concerned that Devon County Council is not taking their invasion seriously. The lay-by at Hillhead is of particular concern, as DCC has introduced the infestation in its road waste storage.

DCC will treat Japanese Knotweed on its land, but not on private land, which is the responsibility of the landowner (who may be reported to DEFRA). Himalayan Balsam is not treated by Devon County Council routinely unless there are safety issues, such as visibility at a junction - more details are available at www.devon.gov.uk/weed_clearance.htm.

Councillors consider this approach as very short-sighted, as Himalayan Balsam is spreading fast and will become far more costly to treat in the future. They have asked that the County Council review its treatment regime.

The Post Office arrangements in Ugborough are still up in the air. At our Parish Council Meeting, we were advised that the 'Hosted Outreach Service could not be held at St Peters Church due to technical difficulties'. However, I have since heard from the Post Office, who is hoping that these technical difficulties (getting the broadband connection into the church) may now have been overcome. Suggestions for alternative locations for the service are still invited - please submit your suggestions to the Clerk.

<u>A snowy Christmas</u> is probably not on the cards, but Christmas cheer is being promoted by the Parish Council. As in previous years, it has agreed to help fund Christmas displays in Ugborough and Bittaford, and Richard Prowse will kindly be providing the trees in both villages. Christmas greetings from all at the Parish Council!

I expect you think I have forgotten to include an item on planning applications - there were none!

The next Meeting will be at 7.30pm on Wednesday 14th December, and you are welcome to attend. Agenda and minutes are displayed on the Council's noticeboards and website.

A Community Outreach by Bittaford Methodist Church

St Peter's Church, Ugborough

Church Heating- Peter Povey

The Stop Press message in November's Newsletter gave the good news that the Diocese of Exeter has allocated funds from its *Million for Mission* Fund to allow the Parochial Church Council (PCC) to install wall-mounted radiant electrical heaters in the community area at the rear of St. Peter's Church. This scheme, which is a temporary arrangement authorised for five years, was devised by Philip Mann and Adrian Southwood, with the assistance of Dave Farnham of the Diocesan Advisory Committee, and Dimplex Ltd. As we want to have this heating in place for the winter, the work has been commissioned urgently, and by the time you read this edition of the Newsletter, the heaters should already be in use.

The PCC still intends to pursue a permanent scheme for the Church, using Green Energy if possible, and to explore the capture of solar energy through Photo-Voltaic (PV) cells, and continues to discuss potential systems with heating engineers, and with South Hams District Council officers and English Heritage. However, the Government's precipitate decision to slash Feed-in Tariff payments challenges the financial viability of PV systems.

"Christmas is just for kids"

I wonder how many times we have heard that statement," Christmas is just for kids."

Well actually it's time to blow this myth, Christmas is not just for kids, Christmas is for us all! It is true to say that children may be the ones who receive many of the gifts, but Christmas is very definitely for each and every one of us

The giving and receiving of gifts in a Christian context has been happening for two thousand years or more. For it was the Wise Men who first introduced the custom of giving gifts, you may remember that they brought Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh to the infant Jesus. Simple but relevant gifts in those days.
