#### Historical Nugget- Gareth (Taff) Jones

23 May 1947 - India. The Cabinet agreed to the partition of India. Lord Mountbatten's plan to divide India into two parts, one Muslim and the other Hindu dominated has attracted much criticism over the years as to how it was done with the resulting ethnic violence between the two religions. The Hindu Congress Party was resigned to partition but wanted a joint administrative capital, their ambitions were thwarted by the Muslim League which insisted on the formation of Pakistan in the North-West. It is written that an activist, Choudhry Rahmat Ali, coined the name Pakistan from the names of regions in the North-West; Punjab, Afghania, Kashmir, Sindh and Baluchistan. The Moslem League wanted a corridor across India to form a link to the predominantly Muslim Bengal region (East Pakistan), however, this demand was never met. After a bloody war in the early seventies, during which many atrocities were committed, the new country of Bangladesh was eventually recognised by Pakistan in 1974.

One major problem facing the British, and indeed many Indians, was to resolve the division of the Armed Forces. The Indian Air Force needed to divide its aircraft, the Navy its ships and all the garrisons/bases, equipment and personnel to support the fledgling services of the two countries. The Army especially had a proud tradition of loyal service to the British Crown and a decision on dividing the Battalions was left to the leaders of India/Pakistan. Regarding the Gurkha units, Britain's youngest ever Brigadier, a certain Enoch Powell, was tasked, with an Indian Army major, of identifying which regiments joined the British Army (2nd, 6th, 7th and 10th). The remaining six regiments joined the Indian Army on January 1st, 1948. It is left to history to record the amount of killing, rape, beatings and carnage in general that ensued in the months, and indeed years, after partition of the sub-continent.

<u>Your Stars Tonight</u>. It was such a wacky idea that I couldn't refuse to do it. A complete stranger had contacted the steamed dietor wanting to give their husband an unusual Christmas present - a guided tour of the sky at night - and would I be available? After we had sorted out how much I would charge -a donation to Médecins sans Frontières was mutually agreeable - we were all set. All we needed was a clear night without too much moon bleaching

the stars out ... and it had to be a Saturday.

It has been awful star gazing weather so far in 2023, and come April, the Christmas present had yet to be delivered. Then for the Easter weekend a clear night was predicted. To ensure a good view I had obtained permission to use a field at the top of the hill looking towards Dartmoor. Just after sunset I nervously shepherded everyone through the gate in the dusk light - the party had grown with the unexpected addition of one well behaved dog plus a sprightly 90-year-old mother-in-law - and we all settled down in our fold up chairs, with blankets and thermos flasks, to await the celestial developments.

Venus was the first to pop out of the fading light, and a few minutes later we saw our first star - Sirius low over the western horizon. Then an orange Mars appeared higher in the darkening sky and after 30 minutes we managed to spot the faint light of the elusive planet Mercury, well below Venus, and, as always, it was hurrying to hide below the horizon.

I had not had a night under the stars since before Christmas as the weather has been so awful, and in the meantime the stars in their constellations have moved almost a quarter turn in their eternal annual rotation around the Pole Star. Additionally I was disorientated as we were looking west to an uncluttered horizon which I can't see from my south facing garden. So it was a delight to spot Orion, the Hunter, with his faithful dog (Canis Major) at his heels, still marching across the sky - although they will disappear below the horizon in the next few weeks. Then as more stars came out we spotted the Twins, Castor and Pollux, and then turning to look east we saw the seven stars of the Plough, or Great Bear, slowly emerging from the deepening gloom. From there we followed the line of the top two stars pointing towards the Pole Star around which the celestial sky revolves - it is quite a faint star which can be difficult to spot but eventually it became dark enough. And perhaps the delight of the night was to find the Pleiades star cluster just above Venus, a wonderous scattering of dozens of glittering diamonds through the binoculars. We felt a kinship with the heroic prehistory navigators of Polynesia and Australia to whom the Pleiades were trusty guides on their travels.

We were all (especially mother-in-law) reluctant to leave the field after over two hours of star gazing, having feasted on three planets, a dozen constellations and the knowledge that above us were the million stars of our home galaxy and then stretching out to infinity were countless galaxies stretching to the edges of the universe. Just the four of us, plus the dog, in a silent field above Ugborough, free from the distractions of social media and Netflix. Just us, sharing the knowledge of the universe slowly revealing itself above our heads.

G-UP! Greener Ugborough Parish is a voluntary community group supporting local people to address environmental challenges. This month we explore energy solutions for cars and homes. We also have a top tip for greener gardening this spring...

Car use makes up a quarter of an average person's carbon footprint — around 3 tonnes of carbon dioxide each year. It would take 40 years for a tree planted today to draw that much carbon out of the atmosphere. In a rural place like Ugborough, few people have the option of not driving but reducing it by 10% could make a big difference. G-UP have been trying to think of ways to do this. One option is to share more journeys with friends or neighbours, through informal arrangements or apps advertising offers of lifts for longer journeys (we like a Cornish app called the Pasty Connection) and https://liftshare.com/uk for regular commutes.

Would you be interested in trying one or more of these options? GUP is looking for a small team of volunteers to test out some **car-share solutions** and report back to us. Please email <a href="mailto:greenerugp@gmail.com">greenerugp@gmail.com</a> if you are interested.

At the end of March, Ugborough's own sustainable building expert, Caroline Martin, led a discussion on energy efficiency at home. We learned that the key to retrofitting a house effectively is to get the ventilation right before improving insulation, so that better insulation doesn't lead to problems with damp or mould. Sealing draughts with draught excluder, heavy curtains etc, can be an easy fix. #### Clear Water below Ugborough by Graham Gilbert

#### Water Quality and Why We Test the Water.

Thanks to the recent programmes by Paul Whitehouse ("Our Troubled Rivers", available on BBC iPlayer) and Countryfile ("Troubled Waters", also on iPlayer) more people are becoming aware of the bad state of our rivers. We are lucky in Devon that the Avon, Erme, Dart, and Yealm are in better health than most, but they are still not in great condition.

In Ugborough we have several spring-fed streams that flow into the Bowcombe Brook which joins the Lud Brook which in turn feeds into the Erme. The Erme carries on down to the sea entering the salty water at Mothecombe, a very popular swimming beach.

But here's the thing. That beach is the second worst in the region for sewerage pollution and the **10**<sup>th</sup> worst in the country. Which is why there is a growing number of people in the Erme catchment who want action to change this.

In recent editions of the Newsletter we have written, often with a sense of humour, of the testing several Ugborians carry out on the Bowcombe Brook and Lud Brook as part of the initiative by the Westcountry Rivers Trust to involve ordinary people in a region-wide citizen science project collecting and collating data on our rivers' health. There are now four Ugborians engaged in the project, and we intend to focus on the health of the Lutterburn, a tributary of the Bowcombe Brook, as well as the aforementioned streams, plus the sewer outflow from the Ugborough water treatment works.

Talking of which, here are the figures for the treatment works: Ugborough storm settlement outflow 2021, 161.3 hours. 2022, 47.2 hours Ugborough combined sewer outflow 2021, 15.3 hours. 2022, 58.9 hours

When it rains, runoff joins the sewers increasing the volume. To prevent overload this is stored in a Storm Settlement Tanks to be treated later. If rain persists this will overflow into the Bowcombe Brook via SSOs. These spills must be measured and reported by SW Water.

Very heavy/prolonged rain overloads the sewers. This triggers releases from Combined Sewer Outflows (CSOs or SOs) and Storm Settlement Outflows (SSOs) into the Bowcombe Brook. These must also be recorded and reported.

So what goes into the treatment works, from our loos, sinks, drains, etc., can in the right (or should that be wrong) circumstances find its way to Mothecombe where friends and family might just be paddling or taking a dip. Then there's runoff from fields: slurry from farmyards, fertilisers, animal pee and poo, all exacerbated, of course, when it rains.

We can all do our part to help our rivers recover and with it our wildlife and our heath and well-being. More on this next time.

#### Beryl's Bookworms - Katie Lloyd

Our book this month was The Burgess Boys by Elizabeth Strout, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for her 2009 story, Olive Kitteridge. We had, on the whole, really enjoyed her previous books so it was surprising that we had a very mixed response to this novel which follows a particular family's history where the setting swings from New York to rural Maine. It tells the story of two brothers, both lawyers but very different characters, who are trying to help their sister whose son has committed a serious racial offence. The book grapples with issues of identity, marriage, race, immigration, class, and politics.

We had a lively discussion and agreed that Strout's characterisation and ability to communicate complex family dynamics are excellent. Also noted, is her skill in weaving in characters from her other books which we felt is both skilful and satisfying.

We agreed that she also gave a very real and moving portrayal of the problems that immigration can have on a community as seen through the eyes of a Somali gentleman; seen by some of the group as one of the most successfully drawn characters.


However, many felt that the novel is unrelentingly depressing in its portrayal of an unhappy, dysfunctional family with too many deeply flawed characters. Some felt that it was hard to relate to the family members and could not feel sympathy with the perpetrator of a racially motivated crime.


The final score was 3.7 out of 5 - and ranged from 4.5 from some members whilst others gave it 2.5. It always makes for a lively book group evening when our opinions differ widely!

#### Rainfall at Shellwood Hill- George Arnison

Continuing on from February and the second half of January, March started off dry...and then it began raining, and continued to do so for the rest of the month. So after our driest February in the last 14 years, we ended up with our wettest March (equal with 2018). We recorded 230mm (just over 9") at Shellwood Hill, almost double the month's average of 117mm. According to the Met Office it was the 6th wettest March across the UK since 1836.

April has been a busy month. On Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> April we hosted the Annual Parish Meeting and 2 weeks later on the 17<sup>th</sup> it was our regular monthly meeting.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

It was lovely to welcome 6 members of the public to the Annual Parish Meeting. Sadly, due to sickness, our guest speakers Tamsin Thomas, (Project Officer, Dartmoor Our Common Cause: Our Upland Commons) and Ella Briens, (Dartmoor Ranger) were unable to attend. We do hope however to accept their offer to present at a Council meeting later in the year to talk about Our Upland Commons which is a £3 million project, helping to secure the future of upland commons in England. Three Commons on Dartmoor are included.

Cllr Joan Fletcher welcomed everyone to the meeting and presented the parish council's annual report. (See our website) The Council has achieved much over the year, and she thanked the Parish Councillors and the Clerk for their support and hard work and also the community for the enthusiasm and contributions from so many individuals.

Cllr Holway reminded those present that the Parish Meeting offered an opportunity to vote on matters of community interest and so it was agreed unanimously that the Council write to the Academy Trust expressing disappointment at them not making space available for pre-school provision and also denying access to the School Field.

#### **April Council Meeting**

Two members of the public attended the meeting.

#### The following matters had been raised with Councillors since the last meeting:

- Complaint from Wrangaton regarding lack of refuse collections and a reminder from Cllr Holway asks that all issues be reported on the South Hams District Council website if possible so that a true picture of service delivery can be seen.
- A member of the public requested an update on the situation regarding community use of the School Field.

#### School Field

UPC has received a letter from the school declining the request for open community use of the school grounds. A working group has visited Yealmpton School to see how community use of their field is managed there and we are going to write to Ugborough School and ask for details of what would be needed to make use possible in Ugborough. We have set up a working group to take the matter forward.

#### **Bittaford Play Park**

The new gates have been purchased and installed by Dartmoor National Park Authority and the new swing and accessible picnic bench ordered. Thanks to DCC for grant funding towards the bench.

#### Highways & Rights of Way

- We looked at 3 quotations for additional and bigger **road signs at the Beacon View** junction and these will now be ordered. A team of volunteers will erect the signs.
- We are pleased that G Wilson will be coming along to our May meeting to talk to us in more detail about the **Ivybridge Bittaford cycle route**
- We have agreed to contact Jon Pearson Ltd (authors of the residential travel plan) to request they pursue re-instatement of the **bus-stop at The Sidings.**

#### **Community Award**
