Update on playing field above the school - Rowan Martin

Thanks to everyone who signed the letter from Ugborough residents to the school in May sharing how valued this field is to the community and the impact of its closure over the last year. Close to 100 people signed the letter, including many of the residents who helped to create this resource for the school and wider community originally. The school offered to meet with the Parish Council and representatives of the community to discuss the issue further and a meeting was held in July with Joan Fletcher, Henry Berriman and Rowan Martin, Lucy French and Kären Sims-Sterling in attendance. The meeting focused on how community access could be managed within the terms of the standard general letting agreement that is used by Westcountry Schools Trust for all their properties. Westcountry Schools Trust took over the running of the school from the local authority in January 2022.

The meeting was constructive, and it initially appeared a compromise that satisfied everyone could be found. However we've subsequently been told that there is no flexibility within the letting agreement which means that use is only possible if arranged in advance for specific purposes with individual users needing to hold public liability insurance, have a safeguarding policy and trained first aiders and adult supervision present.

It is now clear that a different agreement will need to be established with the school/Westcountry Schools Trust that brings us closer to the long-standing arrangement that existed between the Parish Council and Devon County Council for many years. Hopefully it won't be long until children in the village have a space to play again.

Ugborough Steepers- Graham Gilbert

We're very pleased to announce that Devon Rural Skills Trust (DRST) will hold its annual hedge-laying competition this year at Hillhead Farm, Ugborough by kind permission of David and Jane Johns. It will take place on Saturday 1st October. There will be three classes in the event. Competitors in the Open Class will lay 10 yards, Intermediates/Veterans (Over 60) will lay 8 yards and Novices will lay 6 yards. Cups and prizes will be awarded to the winners in each class and there will be a cup for the best lady competitor. The Jack Connabeer Memorial Cup will be presented to the best placed DRST non-prize winner. There is also a cup for the best regrowth on the previous competition hedge, which was held at Cutwellwalls near Avonwick in October 2019. The event has taken place since 1992 but due to Covid restrictions the competition did not take place in 2020 or 2021.

Briefing of competitors and drawing of lengths will take place at 9.15 a.m. and work will start at 9.30 and cease at 2.30 p.m.

Points are awarded for cutting and laying, crooking (securing the cut branches), tidiness of brash piles, safety, and stock proof quality. Prize winners are announced once the completed lengths have been marked by the Judges.

Hedges are laid to rejuvenate them, to increase their environmental diversity and to make them stock-proof. Material cut out during the competition (brash) provides firewood and coppice products (e.g. pea and bean sticks, thatching spars, wattle hurdle material). The rest will be chipped, burnt, made into biochar or used to provide wildlife habitats.

Spectators are most welcome, and it will be your chance to see how hedge-laying is done. You will also be able to see the hedge we laid last year along Northways Lane. This has grown back well despite the dry weather and shows a much wider variety of flora then was evident before it was laid. The individual "standard" trees we left are benefiting from less competition and more light.

The search begins for Devon's Best Young Landscape Artist 2022

Young artists aged 18 and under can now compete for the title of Devon's Best Young Landscape Artist 2022. We held the competition for the first-time last year and were really impressed with the quality and quantity of entries from across the county.

Our charity is inviting budding young artists to showcase their creativity by capturing Devon's unique and precious landscapes in the medium of their choice. There are two entry categories – one for teenagers (aged 12-18) and one for younger children (age 7-11) – with cash prizes for the winners.

Exeter-based landscape artist Kath Hadden will again join our Director Penny Mills to judge the entries. We are hoping to receive as many original pictures and paintings as we did in 2021, when the winners were Christopher Moore with his mixed-media seascape and Matilda Baker with her verdant Dartmoor scene.

Anything goes as far as the choice of landscape is concerned – as long as it's in Devon. It could be a favourite beach or beauty spot, a local park or green space, somewhere visited on a day out or even the artist's own garden.

The competition is simple to enter with cash prizes for each age category. £100 for the winner in each age category. £25 runner up prizes. To enter, simply post us your entry which must be A3 or A4 size, with your name, age and contact details on the back and post to us at Devon CPRE, PO Box 26, Beaworthy, EX21 5XN. Beryl's Bookworms – Katie Lloyd

Slow Horses, by Mick Herron, was definitely a marmite book for Ugborough book club in July.



Located in Regent's Park, Slough House is the setting for Slow Horses and is a dingy realm, patrolled by Jackson Lamb, a shambling but brilliant spy presiding over his discredited MI5 team, the Slow horses.

The start of the book, several of our members found, was bewildering because of the number of characters involved. As the plot unfolds, the slow horses inevitably have a situation on their hands which is also rather confused.

This motley band of fools and failures need to rise to the occasion in the first of the Slough House series.

Those of us who did make our way through the tangle, really enjoyed the plot and the humour - particularly when it centred around Lamb himself.

The series is reminiscent of some of the novels by John Le Carré, who was a huge influence for Mick Herron. The complications and machinations of our political and security systems depicted in the book come very close, we felt, to reality. One of Herron's characters, a blond-haired, chaotic member of parliament seemed particularly recognisable.

Those of our group who don't enjoy the genre of spy thrillers found it a real chore to get through and several gave it a score of 2. Others really clicked with it and there were several scores of 4 and above, meaning the average score was just above 3 out of five.





Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

The very dry year continued through June and July, both of which had significantly below average rainfall – July spectacularly so. At Shellwood Hill I recorded 61mm (a bit less than 2%") of rain in June (compared to the monthly average of 97mm), whilst in July we had just 10mm (less than %") which was a long, long way below the monthly average of 82mm.

It was the driest July since I started recording – and nationally went down as the driest since 1935. We had a national three-day heat-wave mid-month which saw the hottest temperature ever recorded in the UK (a hardly imaginable 40.3°C at Coningsby in Lincolnshire). My garden thermometer topped here at 32°C (in the shade) which was quite hot enough.







<u>Your Stars Tonight</u>. Several times in the last few blistering weeks (but who knows what the weather will be when you are reading this) I have looked up to the skies hoping for a few dark clouds to obscure the sun. In their absence I had to make do with what I could find in the cool of the night while hunting the dark clouds of interstellar dust which stand out against the starry background of the Milky Way. This now arches across the heavens as soon as darkness falls and

one of these dust clouds can be seen by the naked eye. It divides the Milky Way into two faint ribbons of light from almost directly above and then they shimmer down to the constellation of Sagittarius just above southern horizon. And pause for a moment - for you are looking at the heart of our galaxy where a gigantic black hole sits browsing on nearby stars and dust clouds which are falling into it as a result of its enormous gravitational pull.

Now move your eyes up and to the left following the faint light of the Milky Way and almost due south you come to Altair, the brightest star in the constellation of Aquila, the eagle. Just above Altair is a fainter star and with binoculars on a clear moonlit night to the right of it you should just glimpse a dark patch looking a bit like a capital "E" on its side. This dark cloud is officially designated Barnard 143 and is about the size of the moon and completely blacks out the hundreds of stars behind it. Over the years I failed many times to spot Barnard 143 until I realised it is too faint to see with the naked eye, but a telescope magnifies it too much - binoculars are the ideal way to glimpse it. The American astronomer, Edward Barnard catalogued 350 dark clouds when he was not pursuing his other enthusiasm (or perhaps obsession?) of comet hunting. Back in the 1880's there was a \$200 financial incentive for each new comet sighting and after his initial five discoveries he was able to pay for his first house.

Late one night I was fooling around with my telescope and took some photographs of the sky directly above, which currently has the constellation of Cygnus the Swan embedded in the Milky Way. When I developed the photographs, they showed dazzling thousands of stars crammed together like a spilt bag of sugar. This area is also rich in interstellar gas and glows with a ghostly pink light as it is irradiated by new stars being born inside the dozens of dark sinuous rivulets of dust that criss-cross the area.

All this led me to thinking of cool dark pools of water and the delights of wild swimming as a way of escaping the heat. Unfortunately a few weeks ago I was reading about sewage treatment - the sort of thing one does when there is little else happening in the world (or perhaps as a relief from what is happening in the world) when I came across the *River Trust* website which publishes the results reported by the English water companies for each of their sewage outlets. It is easy to use - you start with a map of the UK and can then zoom in to Ugborough and click on our own little "Water Treatment Works" down the bottom of the hill. It's sobering reading.

In 2021 there were seventeen storm overflows of sewage totally more than 160 hours which raises a little niggle about swimming in the Erme estuary. And thoughts of plunging into the cool water of the Avon near Gara Bridge were definitely taken off the agenda on finding that South Brent achieved sixty-one overflows, totally 1122 hours last year. If this is the best SW Water can achieve in the 21st century perhaps some of us should be chaining ourselves to the local sewage works gates, or super glueing ourselves to the SW Water Chief Executive, to shame them into improving their dismal environmental record, so that we can swim in stream, river, estuary and sea, knowing that the water is clean.

The 20mph speed limit for Ugborough. Our failure to be included in the list for the top four 'most in need' communities for the scheme, was a bitter disappointment. DCC Cllr Dan Thomas is now investigating alternative possibilities of the Parish Council providing funding towards its introduction. A request had also been received from a resident for a 40mph speed limit along the A3121, where there had recently been a very dramatic speed-related accident – sadly, the response from DCC Highways does not look at all positive.

The community use of the school field was also discussed, and members of the public attended the August Parish Council Meeting to voice their disappointment at the arrangement currently offered by the school. The next steps will be to set up a Working Party and ask WeST for a meeting to discuss the possibility of a more flexible letting agreement.

Dangerous trees along the highways were highlighted, especially with the prevalence of ash dieback. DCC Highways are inspecting trees along A&B roads, and you can report hazardous trees on the DCC website.

SHDC news: Currently, there are 120 Ukrainians in the South Hams, and steps are being taken to rehouse those where existing placements have broken down. The recycling & waste collections and brown bin collections will be taken back in-house from October, with a six-month handover. Community Land Trusts were making a significant entry to deliver affordable housing, including the South Dartmoor Community Energy's application for 30 affordable homes – have a look at https://www.sdce.org.uk/community-housing.html. Finally, 'My Place, My Views' is an online pilot scheme to identify residents' views on local places and services, https://pshwd.commonplace.is/

Planning applications considered at the Meeting (with the Parish Council recommendation in **bold**): 1. 2084/22/OPA Outline application (all matters reserved) for the provision of new 120 Social, Emotional & Mental Health (SEMH) School including new two storey teaching block with associated hard & soft landscaping at Land at SX 648 561 Rutt Lane lvybridge Support. The £20k S106 funding was inadequate in the light of the crossing proposals and improved cycleway from lvybridge to Bittaford: £100k S106 funding was needed. A crossing to the East of Godwell Lane would be preferred

2. <u>0295/22</u> Retention of mobile home for rural worker at Old Pony Paddock, land to east of Ugborough Road, Bittaford **Object. More details were needed**

The Bittaford playpark footpath is being laid as I type. Access to the playpark will be much smoother, and the improvements will enable those with disabilities to access a new picnic bench. Eagle-eyed villagers will also have noticed the new plaque displayed on the flagpole in Ugborough Square.

A new mobile library bringing books to rural communities has launched this year.

Libraries Unlimited bought the vehicle with the help of Devon County Council and launched a successful fundraising campaign to refurbish it.

Now the mobile library will make 80 stops around the South Hams and West Devon each week, joining the four others in the Libraries Unlimited fleet.

The vehicle hit the road this March, and now travels over 800 miles every month.

"We bring 2,000 books for people to browse or order, including large print and audio books. Just as importantly, our mobile library will bring a smile, a chat, a chance to talk to other local people, and contact with the wider world in Devon and beyond. Many of the villages we visit have no public transport, so regular visits to our library buildings could be impossible for many. It is much more than a book delivery van though. The mobile library is an educational, social, wellbeing, and cultural service."

The new mobile library has replaced a much-loved vehicle nicknamed Gertie, following many thousands of miles service in the area. Last year customers borrowed over 11,300 books from Gertie.
