The U13s did well against an excellent Dawlish side in the County Cup, but ended up with a 6-2 reverse in the mud at Brent. The crowd were impressed with what they saw, but one lifelong Uggies fan, Steve Hughes told Sports Report; "Our goal scoring is like ketchup, you never know how much is going to come out of the bottle".

The U9s showed some more depth to the squad with a straight-forward 6-0 thrashing of Waldon despite fielding 3 of the 6 year olds towards the end of the game. FAIR FUNDING FOR DEVON SCHOOLS

Teachers and school governors in Devon have this month launched a campaign for 'fairer' funding for schools in Devon.

The Hands Up for Fairer School Funding campaign says the county is one of the worst funded education authorities in England, ranked 148^{th} out of 151 councils. In practical terms, funding for every pupil in Devon is £3,842 - £375 less than the national average of £4,217.

Your Stars Tonight. "What a wonderful time of year for stars" I exclaim as I remove my gloves and scarf, "and there is a two for one offer on planets as well this month. Orion is back in the evening sky with his belt and dagger - you can just see the faint patch of the Orion nebula in his belt. Jupiter still dominates as the brightest object in the south western skies before it sets around 10 pm - but the real treat is Mars which is now rising in the South East at around 9pm. You can't miss it because it is about the second brightest object in the sky and it has got such a distinctive orange red colour".

I peel off my balaclava knitted by my long departed grandmother and can scarcely contain my enthusiasm for the wonders of the December night sky. "Through the binoculars Mars is a small angry orange disc with just a hint of detail on its surface. It's going to get brighter all through Christmas until the end of January when it will be as bright as Sirius - that's when it will be at its closest. " I pause for breathe while removing my salopettes which are proving to be welcome protection from the chilly winter night, before proceeding. "Of course the Maths is a bit difficult to explain - and I expect $2\pi r$ comes into it - but if you think of us on earth circling the sun -with Mars on the outside track you start to get the picture. It gets more complicated because we go round the sun in one year while Mars takes a year and 320 days to get back to the same place. So that means we overtake it on the inside lap every 780 days which is when we are nearest to each other.

I pull off my Arctic Fox snow boots with patent cosy foot lining and enthuse "But do remember that none of the planets has a circular orbit around the sun - they all actually do slight ellipses and so every so often that closest point is even closer - it varies between 55 and 78 million kilometres - remember that time back in August 2003 there was internet scare about the end of the world when we were the closest for 60,000 years." As the warmth comes back to my extremities I pontificate "Amazing how all these civilisations like the ancient Babylonians, Mayans and Chinese managed to accurately predict the movement of the planets across the backdrop of the stars - they must have collected data for decades before they started to see a pattern it."

I realize that the steamed dietor is staring at me wild eyed - and wearing her fathers WWII tin helmet. "They say we are doomed" she moans, "Ugborough will be beneath the waves by 2012 and it's all in the stars."

I decide on the Churchillian calming mode "Just make a nice cup of tea dear" I say as I remove my Men'r'Us fisherman's jumper "and remember what your mother used to say never trust the internet, a Hollywood film plot or a past by his sell by date Mayan"

History Corner Alan Yates

At the 2008 Ugborough Fair Concert, our esteemed editor sang Pete Seeger's "Where have all the flowers gone?" Historical records do not tell us the answer, but a couple of old adverts for timber auctions do give us some understanding of where all the trees have gone. The first relates to Fowlescombe in the 18th.C and the second to a sale on behalf of Mr Arthur White of Wrangaton Manor in the 19th.C, both of which suggest suitable uses for the timber. It is also interesting to note that in 1776 the suggested route for transporting the timber is via the navigable part of the River Arm, which is presumably what we now know as the Erme.

NOTICE is hereby given, That on Saturday the 22nd. of this Instant February, by Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, a public SURVEY will be held at the Half-Moon, Modbury, for felling Two Hundred Eighty-three Oak Trees, Great Part whereof are Capital Ones, in all Respects fit for His Majesty's Navy. Also fifty fine Maiden Ash, and thirty Sycamore Trees, mark'd,

number'd, standing and growing on the Barton of Fowelscombe, in the Parish of Ugborough and the County of Devon, at no great Distance from the Navigable Part of the River Arm, to which they may be conveyed at an easy Expense. <u>Become a Parish Councillor</u> Twelve members of the public attended the November Parish Council Meeting. This level of interest is very gratifying as a vacancy has arisen for a new Parish Councillor, following the resignation of Geoff Burrell, who found his work commitments regularly clashed with Parish Council Meetings - I think we will all miss Geoff, whose contribution in debates was always very perceptive.

The Statutory Notice of the vacancy will have expired by the time you receive your newsletter and the Parish Council is keen to fill the vacancy as soon as possible by cooption - so put your name forward and get involved in the life of your parish! With cooption, you will not have to face an election and the role of Parish Councillor is interesting and rewarding, with a commitment of only one evening meeting a month. <u>The Housing Needs Report</u>, which was presented by Rural Housing Officer John Scott, started the Parish Council Meeting. John has submitted a separate item for the Newsletter and a full copy of the Report can be accessed on the Parish Council website, www.ugboroughparishcouncil.gov.uk

Questions from the Public related to three separate concerns:

Complaints were again raised concerning the Dartmoor National Park Authority decision-making procedure in relation to the replacement bungalow at The Retreat, Shute Lane, Wrangaton and the Clerk is writing to the DNPA asking what measures are available when, as in these circumstances, objections are raised to a planning decision and the decision-making process. Also at the meeting were our regular Cutwellcombe parishioners, who confirmed that the Public Enquiry was to be held on the 24th November (and not as stated in the October Newsletter). Finally, supporters from the Reddacleave Brakes Golf Course attended the meeting to rally support against the enforcement action being taken by the Dartmoor National Park Authority, which would result in the golf course being closed down. Although the golf course lies in Dean Prior parish, a significant number of Ugborough parishioners regularly use it, and its impact on the moor would appear to be minimal. The Parish Council has therefore objected to the enforcement action.

The Moorhaven Playing Field plans are slowly moving forward, as details such as insurance cover have been resolved and the Highway Authority has given a more positive approach to the proposal. The next step is to carry out a detailed survey of the field to establish its geology and whether planning permission is required to level it. Exciting ideas have been proposed, including an adventure playground in the woods and multi-use on one of the tennis courts.

<u>Christmas</u> is fast approaching and the Parish Council is again entering into the Christmas spirit by arranging for trees to be provided to Bittaford Community Hall and Ugborough Church - thanks to the generosity of Richard Prowse. Grants will also be given to the Ugborough PCC, Bittaford Methodist Church and Bittaford Community Hall to cover the cost of Christmas lighting.

<u>Grant funding</u> is available from the Greater Dartmoor Local Action Group (Local Enterprise Action Forum), which has £1.8m to spend on environmentally sustainable projects which will bring economic benefit to the area. Further details are available on <u>www.greaterdartmoorLEAF.org</u> - as funding will be allocated on a first come/first served basis, it is advisable to submit funding applications as soon as possible.

Funding is also available from Devon Renaissance to help create prosperity and jobs and to improve access to services in rural areas, and their team also gives hands-on project development support. For more details, call 01837 658 643 or email info@ruraldevon.org.

<u>Planning Applications</u> No objections were raised to the proposed studio and entrance loggia at Rose Villas, Bittaford or the extension at Full Circle Motors, Ermington Road, Ivybridge (which lies just outside the Parish boundary); and the Parish Councillors supported the resubmitted application to convert a barn to a new dwelling at Hayloft, Haye Farm, Ludbrook.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Thursday 10th December and you are welcome to attend.

UGBOROUGH HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY REPORT John Scott

In the May the Devon Rural Housing Partnership with Ugborough Parish Council carried out a survey to discover if there are a significant number of people living or working in Ugborough who have not been able to obtain housing suitable to their circumstances.

There were a total of 15 Surveys returned, which is a response rate of 36.5%.

- 8 households were found to be in housing need with a local connection to Ugborough.
- The biggest reason for wanting to move was the cost of their existing home.
- House prices in the parish were shown to be high and unaffordable for first time buyers on a typical local income.

WHAT THE REPORT RECOMMENDS......

• There is need for the provision of 8 affordable homes.

WHAT NOW??

The Rural Housing Enabler will work with Ugborough Parish Council and South Hams District Council to work up proposals for affordable housing in the Parish.
