

The steamed dietor looks gloomily at the remnants of the vegetable garden where an invasion of slugs, revelling in the Indian Summer, has much reduced her cabbage and leek harvest. Her fulminations indicate she is planning a

merciless revenge involving mega slug pellets, beer traps and/or their forced migration to next door's garden. I venture to suggest that she may find the astronomical constellation Cassiopeia of relevance to her current plight. In Greek mythology (their round the fire version of East Enders) Cassiopeia was a boastful Ethiopian Queen who was punished by having a monster let loose on her lands. As one does when in this sort of situation (Ugborough parents may feel her solution has relevance today) she decided to get rid of the problem by chaining her daughter Andromeda to a convenient rock - presumably to provide the monster with its lunch. Luckily Perseus happened to be passing by and saved the maiden.

The Ugborough evening night sky continues to be dominated by the bright orange Jupiter while the boastful Ethiopian is now frozen forever into the constellation Cassiopeia – almost directly overhead now and the easily recognisable "W" of 5 bright stars. From there Andromeda is a bit more difficult to pick out as two faint lines of stars below the "W" – while Perseus is to the left of the "W". It may help to find Andromeda if you can identify the "Great Square of Pegasus" – the four brightest stars in the southern sky before midnight – the top left star of the square is alpha Andromeda to which the other stars converge.

It is worth persevering as a treat is in store on a good clear night. First let the eyes adjust to the dark until the soft glow of the Milky Way can be seen - Cassiopeia is set in the middle of it. The Milky Way is the countless millions of stars that make up our galaxy. Now scan the sky between alpha Andromeda and the "W" of Cassiopeia and you may just see a faint haze about the size of a five pence piece held at arm's length. With binoculars it becomes a disc of soft light from the Andromeda nebula. This is a spiral galaxy very similar to ours and is made up of several billion stars. The light you are seeing started its journey two million years ago - when our distant ancestors were struggling for existence in the savannah landscape in the Rift Valley of Africa- and perhaps their evolutionary journey from ape to human made a faltering step as one of them looked up to wonder for the first time at the stars above.

"Andromeda saved by a man" snorts the steamed dietor, "I don't think the women of Ugborough need that sort of sexual stereotype - in the 21^{st} century we women solve our own problems". And so saying she produces a pair of scissors and advances menacingly towards the first grazing slug.

An appeal by Alan Yates-

History Corner Conkers Alan Yates

On Sunday 11th October, James Wong a presenter on BBC's Countryfile, told viewers that the Horse Chestnut is under threat from disease and pest attack. This reminded me of an interview with the late Tom Beable about his life in Ugborough. One of the things he mentions is that during WW1 school children were sent out to collect horse chestnuts (conkers) - "for the war effort", but the exact reason was a closely guarded secret.

There is one well known story that Sir Francis Drakes is reputed to have finished his game of bowls on Plymouth Hoe before setting off to deal with the Spanish Armada and another concerning a truce for a Christmas Day in WW2 when the two opposing sides played a game of football. But troops playing conkers while waiting for a German invasion or a mass game of international conkers on the following Christmas Day is hard to imagine!

An explanation can be found on the Imperial War Museum website which says that the conkers were needed by the Ministry of Munitions to make acetone which in turn was used in the manufacture of cordite which was a propellant for shells. The usual source of acetone was from heavily forested countries from the distillation of timber, but also from maize from the USA and from potatoes. With the problems of trans-Atlantic convoys, the government instructed their scientists to find an alternative source and they came up with the idea of producing it from conkers. In 1917 a factory near Kings Lynn was converted for the purpose and piles of conkers were to be transported there by rail. However this transportation process did not go well and thousands of tons of conkers were left to decay on railway station platforms. The manufacturing process proved not to produce a very good quality of acetone and the whole idea was abandoned only six months later.

P.S. On his television programme, "grow your own drugs", James Wong was using conkers as the base for a treatment for varicose veins!

Sabre-rattling was very much in evidence at the October Parish Council Meeting. To start

with, there were:

Questions from the Public at the start of the meeting. Parishioners raised complaints concerning the planning permission for a replacement bungalow at The Retreat, Shute Lane, Wrangaton - The Chief Planning Officer of Dartmoor National Park Authority determined the application using delegated powers whereas, according to their Development Control Charter, contentious applications (such as this) should be determined by the Planning Committee. The Clerk will be writing to the DNPA asking why such a procedure was adopted.

Also at the meeting were our regular parishioners, asking for progress on the enforcement action at Cutwellcombe - apparently, a Public Enquiry is to be held on the 12th November. I shall be rather sad when Cutwellcombe is finally resolved (will it ever be?) and our regular parishioners no longer attend our Meetings!

The travellers at Wrangaton and Filham resulted in complaints on the role of the police. The travellers moved onto the industrial development site in Wrangaton then, following a Court Order, moved to the Filham Park car park. On both occasions, concerned neighbours contacted the police and were given a log number - but the police did not attend while the travellers moved onto the sites, which would have reassured local residents. The Clerk will be asking the police what powers they have with regard to travellers and requesting that such incidents be regarded as high priority.

The Moorhaven Playing Field Committee had met to move forward the proposal to level the field and make it available to the wider community. DNPA are dragging their feet in relation to confirming whether planning permission is required and issues have arisen concerning traffic generation up Bittaford Hill. Other matters to be resolved include drawing up an acceptable lease agreement, arranging insurance and securing grant funding.

<u>Bittaford Playground</u> is currently owned by the Parish Council, but maintained by SHDC. In an attempt to save money, SHDC is proposing to hand the maintenance of the playground over to the Parish Council – which will result in increased costs for the Parish Council. As Council Tax payers, you will therefore receive a reduced service from SHDC (but no reduction in your Council Tax) and will have to pay more Council Tax to the Parish Council because of its increased responsibilities for the playground. Parish Councillors will be voicing their concerns about this new arrangement at the next Cluster meeting with SHDC.

<u>Choice Based Lettings</u> is a new approach being used by Councils and Housing Associations to let their properties. Vacancies will be advertised on a weekly basis, which applicants can bid for - the property will then be offered to the applicant in greatest housing need. It would appear that this new scheme still awards no priority to *local* housing need and Councillors felt it should receive greater priority as it was important for the social fabric of the community to keep members of that community together.

<u>Planning Applications</u> No objections were raised to the proposed alterations and extension to Meadowside, Bittaford or the rear extension and porch at 1 Palace Cottages, Filham. Provided a 1m wide hedge was reinstated at 1&2 The Old Coach House, Wrangaton, there were no objections to the proposed outbuildings. The proposed off road hard standing at 6 Lutterburn Street, Ugborough received support as it provided additional off-street parking. Finally, Chairman Tom Holway had submitted a planning application for a new dwelling in the grounds of Virginia Lodge, Ugborough and, in accordance with the Code of Conduct, withdrew from the meeting while observations on the application were decided - no objections were raised although, as the application had not been included on the agenda this decision needs ratification at the November meeting.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held at the earlier time of 7.00pm on Thursday 12th November, starting with a presentation on the Housing Needs Survey. You are welcome to attend.

The Archaeology of Devon Parish Churches

An Unpleasant subject— dog fouling in the village. As well as being unsightly and messy, dog fouling can be a serious health hazard, (and is subject to fines.)
