

Notwithstanding by Louis de Bernieres.

I'm not one for short stories, but was pleasantly surprised by 'Notwithstanding'. My previous attempt at reading Louis de Bernieres, sadly lacked staying power, but this book made me laugh from the beginning and made it into a page turner.

'Notwithstanding' is a collection of short stories revolving around a fictional English village and its eccentric inhabitants. He looks back to a time when 'villages were proper communities', with pubs, shops, church and rectory. Wonderful characters fill each of the stories – a mysterious hedging and ditching man, who turns up in most of the stories and Obadiah Oak, the village's last peasant, who exudes the aromas of wet leather and horse manure.



I pull my hoodie down further and mutter into my cocoa about disaffected and deprived star gazers of Ugborough.

"Yes indeed!" retorts the steamed dietor cheerily, "This month's newsletter has several reports from our own correspondent about rioting astronomers in Fore Street and how further unpleasantness was only quelled by the prompt action of PCSO Jacqui Hopper."

"But all the stuff about frolicking frogs and tumultuous toads and Jupiter disappearing from the evening sky by the end of April was left out," I grumble to which she responds in a soothing fashion by saying, "No doubt your star gazing chums will have realised that Venus continues to brighten in the western sky - and of course it will reach maximum brightness in May before disappearing into the glare of the setting sun at the end of the month."

<u>The Police Report</u> The spray painting of 5 cars, causing criminal damage, was highlighted in the Police Report - part of a series across a large area of the south west. Other crimes in March included production of class B drug (cannabis) and burglary by forcing open a patio window.

Residents were advised not to leave valuable items, such as sat nav systems or mobile phones on display in their cars when they leave them - either remove them, or store them out of sight, under the chair or in the car boot. More people are using bikes over the spring & summer. Cyclists should ensure their bikes are properly secured and get them security marked and registered, using the free service, www.immobilise.com.

<u>Bittaford Play Area</u> now has its new play equipment and the existing equipment has had a facelift, thanks to the hard work of ClIrs Sue Daniels and Jim Abraham. The next step is for the Parish Council to provide new round picnic benches to both the Bittaford and Ugborough play areas, which should arrive very shortly - now all we need is the summer weather to enjoy them.

<u>County Cllr Mumford</u> again urged parishioners to press for improved broadband speeds in the parish by going to www.connectingdevonandsomerset.co.uk and completing the speed survey and short questionnaire.

<u>District Cllr Ward</u> announced a 'Super Cluster Meeting' in May, in which the details of a Devolved Services and Assets Project would be discussed.

<u>Cheaper heating oil may now become a reality</u>, following an initiative by the Devon Oil Collective. This new community-based countywide oil buying scheme is run by the Community Council of Devon, and a leaflet and membership form are available from their website www.devonrcc.org.uk, follow the link to Devon Oil Collective. Annual membership costs £24 and savings of up to £120 on 1000 litres of heating oil have been achieved.

The Annual Parish Meeting is to be held at 7.30pm on Monday 14 May at Moorhaven Clubhouse, and this is an opportunity for YOU as parishioners to find out about and have your say on local issues affecting YOU. Wide-ranging issues will be discussed, including highways, parking, local services and affordable housing. At the Meeting, Ian Sherriff, Plymouth University, will be talking about Dementia Friendly Parishes and Frances Reeve will discuss the work of the Ivybridge Memory Cafe. Dementia is a growing problem, where sufferers are often not diagnosed, and those with dementia and their carers can be very isolated. The Dementia Awareness campaign aims to dispel the myths surround it and look at how sufferers and their carers can get the vital support they need.

The Dartmoor National Park Authority is certainly suffering as a result of the economic downturn. Its income has been reduced by over 35%, and 1 in 4 full-time equivalent staff places will be lost over the next 2 years. As a result, the number of planning officers in Development Management and Forward Planning will be reduced, together with the reorganization of key posts. The Parish Council was asked to respond to a consultation on the governance of National Parks: it supported proposals to include some directly elected members, and to remove the need for the Secretary of State to appoint parish members. However, it expressed concern that an 8 year maximum length of service be introduced, as it would result in the loss of valuable experience.

<u>Planning Applications</u> No objections were raised to the proposed minor alterations at Wrangaton House, nor to the replacement stables, hay barn and tack room at North Parsons Park, Ugborough. No objection was also raised to the Listed Building Consent amendments to the internal layout and roof lights at the Hayloft, Haye Farm, Ludbrook, although Councillors did object to the amended openings.

Well outside the Parish, at Luson Farm, Ermington, a solar farm is proposed, and the Parish Council raised no objection provided the proposals satisfied a visual impact assessment.

Support was given to the proposed residential caravan for a temporary period of 10 years at Higher Witchcombe Farm, on the grounds that it would result in reduced travel to work and would replace an existing caravan. It was suggested that conditions be included restricting occupation and requiring the caravan to be removed after the 10 years had expired.

Finally, Councillors were concerned to learn of the unauthorised subterranean extension at Lakeview Cottage, Moorhaven. This was considered as yet another incident of the applicant flouting planning law, and the DNPA were asked to look into the application of any available sanctions.

May is a very busy month for the Parish Council (and its Clerk). First, the accounts will have to be agreed, and notices will be displayed on the noticeboards about the audit. Then, on Wednesday 9th May at the earlier time of 7pm, the Annual Parish Council Meeting will decide on administrative arrangements for the following year, followed by the normal Parish Council Meeting.

Finally, the Annual Parish Meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Monday 14 May at Moorhaven Clubhouse - I hope to see you all there!

Sometimes people ask what Christians actually **do** to help others - this is one of the answers - enabling people with expertise and local knowledge and contacts to bring instant and long-term relief in dire situations - but they do need our prayers and money.

My dear Friends,

Every year on Maundy Thursday all the clergy and authorised lay ministers are invited by our diocesan Bishop to join him in the Cathedral to renew our ordination vows together and to receive the holy oils for use in our parishes. Each year I find the service and the atmosphere very moving and it reinforces the sense of what an incredible privilege it is to have been called to be part of the ministerial body.

But we do not perform our role - distinctive in character though it may be - in isolation; we do it as members of the whole Body of Christ so **all** churchgoers have the responsibility and privilege to minister to one another and to the rest of our communities.

In his sermon, Bishop Bob drew attention to the holy oils as symbols of that ministry. Reflecting on the nature of oil, he reflected that if it's spilt, it can't be put back; if it touches our skin, it reaches into every pore; if it's used it frees up blocked and rusty apparatus; if it's released into God's service, in ways beyond all understanding it brings his grace and power into people's lives.

So we have the Oil of Catechumens - used in making the sign of the cross at Baptism to seal the relationship between God and the new members of the Church. That reminds us of our duty to be missionaries and to bring others to the knowledge of Christ through our examples and teaching.

We have the Holy Chrism - oil mixed with balsam used to mark the setting aside of Christians for their task of ministry and service, most usually in Confirmation and Ordination. We are reminded that we have a duty to ask ourselves if God is calling us to some further task or whether we should be identifying and suggesting to others that they have a special gift that can be used in God's service.

We have the Oil for Anointing the Sick - not just those at the point of death, but people facing an operation or a particular moment in their illness - a sign of healing and caring as well as an acknowledgement of our mortality. All Christians are called to care for those in any sort of need.

So together we embark on another year in the lives of our parishes as the Annual meetings mark new beginnings. Together we are called to be Christ's ministers to his world. We need to make sure - through prayer and worship - that we are nourished and equipped for the task and then we can go out as Easter people in the joy and power of the new life of Christ's resurrection life.
