

Beryl's Bookworms – Joan Fletcher

July's book was Shrines of Gaiety by Kate Atkinson. She won the Whitbread (now Costa) Book of the Year Award with her first novel, Behind the Scenes at the Museum. She has since written three



novels set around the Second World War *Life After Life, A God in Ruins* (both winners of the Costa Novel Award) and *Transcription*. Her bestselling crime novels featuring former detective Jackson Brodie became the BBC TV series Case Histories.

Her latest novel Shrines of Gaiety is set in London in the 1920s. In a country still recovering from the First World War, London is the focus for a delirious nightlife. In Soho clubs, peers of the realm rub shoulders with starlets, foreign dignitaries and gangsters. The story centres on the infamous London nightclubs owned by Nellie Coker (loosely based on Kate Meyrick, the 1920s London nightclub proprietor). Nellie Coker is a ruthless ruler, ambitious for her children. Niven is the eldest, his enigmatic character forged fighting in the Somme in the War. But success breeds enemies and Nellie faces threats from without and within. Beneath the gaiety lies a dark underbelly.

Some of us found the book difficult to get into but glad we persevered as we found it improved with reading. Generally, we found there was a lot of wit and good characterisations. We had a lively discussion about various aspects of London life based on the experiences of some of us over the years.

Comments ranged from it was slow and there were too many asides, difficult to connect with the characters and didn't feel real, to it was absolutely brilliant.

This was reflected in the range of scores from 3 to 4.5. The overall score was just under 4 out of 5.

Clear Water below Ugborough by Graham and David

Testing....12.3.4. Yes, there are now four Westcountry Rivers Trust Citizen Science Investigators in Ugborough. Together with three non-CSIs, the Ugborough Rivers Group now has seven members.

So what have they been up to?

The best way to find out where any problems are occurring on any given stretch of water is to co-ordinate the tests so that they all take place, preferably, at the same time or as close to as possible. On the 21st July your four indefatigable CSIs tested the Bowcombe Brook and Lud Brook, this time including a test just below the water treatment works and a further test above it.

The results clearly showed a substantial increase in phosphate levels from 300ppb upstream of the works to 1000ppb just below the outfall. This can only be attributable to the water treatment works. By the time the Bowcombe Brook reached Ludbrook hamlet the level had been diluted to 200ppb.

The Lud Brook was, as usual, in reasonably good condition although two pollution events on the stream had been recorded by Graham Wilson as it flowed through Whiteley Farm. The pollution originated upstream from the farm and was recorded on camera.

The Erme, sadly, showed a high level of phosphates (500ppb) at Lower Keaton which had dropped to 300ppb at Fawns Bridge (Ermington). Which brings us on to Mothecombe.

So far this year there have been 25 water quality alerts at Mothecombe (Meadowsfoot beach), the latest (as of the time of writing, 5/8/23) was on August 2nd when the Environment Agency issued a Pollution Risk Alert. On the 26th July there was a sewage discharge from a South West Water sewage overflow close by. In all, 12 alerts were issued in July, no doubt due to the high rainfall. If you're a swimmer, or even a paddler, who uses this lovely beach you might like to download the Surfers Against Sewage "Safer Seas and Rivers Service" app which can alert you in real time to pollution events, thereby, perhaps, helping you to avoid sickness due to swimming in polluted waters.

To learn more about the Westcountry Rivers Trust come to Ugborough Sustainable Saturday on 9th September where you can talk to us about our work and also buy a beautiful map (print from original hand-painted by Anna Dunscombe) of the Westcountry Rivers. All proceeds go to the WRT.

We have had 2 meetings since the last Newsletter. Two Members of the public attended our meeting on 3rd July. No members of the public attended the August meeting.

We have been alerted to Himalayan Balsam growing in Bittaford. A team of volunteers have tackled the weed in and around Bittaford Park and will be monitoring the situation. If you would like to help with this, please contact the clerk.

We are sad to say goodbye to Kate Brampton who has recently left Ugborough, and we thank her for her work over the years and, in particular, her weekly and monthly monitoring of the Ugborough Village defibrillator. We wish her all the best in the future.

We discussed the communication received from a member of the public expressing concern at our support at the June meeting for 4 detached houses at Filham. We supported this application on the grounds that the site already has planning permission for 2 properties and the number of properties had increased from 2 to 4 with improved accessibility, the application met all the criteria detailed in our Neighbourhood Plan and the land is infill with no adverse impact noted in the bio-diversity report. As consultees only for planning applications, permissions ultimately lie with South Hams District Council as the planning authority. We remain committed to protecting and enhancing our local environment.

Cllr Abbott is seeking clarification regarding the status and timetable for revision of the Joint Local Plan which sets out the strategy for new housing developments in Plymouth, South Hams and West Devon.

Updates on matters arising from our last meetings:

Beacon View Traffic Management – both the larger signs are now in situ, and, on receipt of special parts, the VAS camera will be installed.

Bittaford viaduct drainage – This matter is still under review.

Bus Stop at the Sidings – This matter has been reviewed by DCC who consider the current provision is sufficient.

Planning

We supported the two applications made since the July meeting:

2038/23/FUL Erection of agricultural storage building, associated engineering works & landscaping on land At SX 671 566 Bittaford, 1857/23/TCA Works to trees at 8 Lutterburn St. – the application was based on recommendations provided by our tree warden

2010/23/FUL CVS (UK) Limited Installation of 1 external air conditioning unit Filham Park Veterinary Clinic Godwell Lane Ivybridge PL21 0LE

We have received notification of ten decisions made by SHDC and these can be viewed on our website.

Finance

We have agreed that the new noticeboard purchased for Bittaford would be better suited for erection in the Ugborough Village bus-stop providing more room to advertise Council Business and freeing up the current free-standing board for community use. We hope to erect the new noticeboard in Ugborough in the next couple of weeks and have ordered a smaller replacement board for Bittaford.

Cllr Hart noted that work was commencing on footpath leaflets for the parish – money has been ear-marked for this.

Wrangaton S106 monies (monies made available for the community through conditions included in planning applications for new developments)

There is £55,000 available which must be used before 2029. SHDC are looking at working on a slight amendment to the agreement and we are hopeful that some of the monies will be made available to fund the work necessary to enable community use of the School Field as a public open space. The application needs to be completed by the school and we continue to aim for the work to take place during the Easter 2024 school holidays. We are also hoping some of the money can be used to develop the Bittaford Play Area and a working group are putting together proposals in anticipation of this decision. Please send any suggestions you might have to the clerk.

Climate Emergency and sustainable Ugborough

A Carbon reduction consultation event is planned for November or Spring 2024 (to be confirmed) It will be principally aimed at reducing carbon emissions and will be a mixture of

presentations and market place style engagement where people can circulate between tables focused on different topics. Topics identified as a priority to date are:

Energy saving in the home

Transport e.g. car sharing, transport links, EV charging

Community energy generation

The Erme catchment water quality initiative

Highways & Rights of Way

We are pleased to confirm that we have approved the detailed documents provided by Devon County Council for the 20 Miles per hour scheme in Ugborough Village and await confirmation of costings and timetable for works from Devon County Council.

Cllr Wells will be discussing with Cllr Dewynter possible solutions to the request for a bus shelter to be erected at Filham on the road heading west into lyybridge.

Your Stars Tonight. At last, the nights are lengthening and star gazing stops being an after-midnight affair. Combine that with temperatures which could be described as sultry - well at least they are over 10°C - it all becomes a little more conducive to star gazing. The only fly in the ointment - or wasp in the Prosecco - is Devon's predilection for an infinite variety of cloud which meant I was only able to get out twice in August.

I was looking forward to the annual Perseids Meteor shower as they would be at their best for years since they peaked on a moonless night and would be undiminished by the glare of the moon. But it rained. I wasn't able to make it the next night, so when I got round to looking out for them it was two days late. The steamed dietor muttered that being late summed up my life - I think that was an oblique gibe about the leisurely pace of the redecoration of the bathroom. I firmly believe that DIY should not be rushed and if allowed to proceed organically over the months, it gives a rich crop of memories to be savoured long after it is finished. The Perseids were well past their peak frequency of 120 per hour and were down to a more serene and stately five. Even so it was good fun, perhaps not quite up to Mission Impossible. Around midnight a number of flashes of light were observed low in the sky but going the wrong way - until I realised they were a local coven of owls circling a nearby field.

Then there was an opportunity to just to sit and look at the Milky Way which at this time of year arches overhead from the SW to NE horizons. Through the binoculars they resolve from a silvery haze to become a seemingly infinite sea of stars. Look again at the Milky Way and you see it is not a continuous band of light but interlaced with rivers of darkness. These are the vast clouds of interstellar dust which black out the stars behind.

I have been doing a lot of fancy long exposure astrophotography on these areas, as the darkness is where new stars are being born from the sea of dust and gas. As these new stars gobble up enough weight, they ignite into thermonuclear fusion which lights up the surrounding gas and dust in a neon pink colour. I have been photographing the "Heart and Soul" Nebula in the constellation of Cassiopeia close to the "Pillars of Creation" made famous in 1995 by the Hubble Telescope images. This nebula is hardly visible to the eye, even through my 8-inch telescope, but with the patient coaxing of 100 images, each 60 seconds long, a lovely expanse of sky glowing red and pink with clusters of intense bright young stars is revealed. Most of the nebula which are well known to astronomers have been given fancy names - Tadpole, Blue Horse, Thors Helmet, Butterfly, Pelican - which often require a good imagination. But the Heart and Soul really does look have a classical heart shape - Valentine card pink. I not too sure about the shapeless blob that makes up the Soul.

And around Midnight a distinctive orange dot appears over the SW horizon - It is Saturn making a welcome return to the UK skies. I am hoping to get some photos of it because the famous rings are beginning to lose their tilt. Back in 2019 they were at 27° but as the Earth and Saturn's orbits move over a 29 year cycle the angle of the ring tilt is getting smaller rapidly and by 2025 it will be edge on and virtually invisible.
