Many thanks to all who made the Parish Council's recent 'Are you prepared for carbon zero?' event possible, and many thanks to those that came to speak to us. We were there, aiming to generate conversation around community energy schemes and using renewables: We are looking at ways to use these together to potentially shrink energy bills for parishioners whilst reducing carbon footprint for our beautiful environment overall.

We also had information about *Wildlink*, our community nature reserve initiative, to hand, as well as some 'hands on' nature activities for children.

What came out of this was an amazing bug hotel - which attendees contributed to through the day, stuffing the apex shaped structure (kindly created by Vasyl Rybchuk) with moss, twigs, bamboo cuttings and bark. This will be sited in Ugborough play park so as to be enjoyed by local children (as well by local bugs and insects whom we look forward to welcoming to their new residence).

This open consultation-style event was the first of its kind locally run by a Parish Council and we are heartened that ours is seeking to generate conversations that need to be had (and acted upon) if we are to reach net zero. We look forward to debriefing on the event with councillors and hearing the actions they are planning.

Historical Nugget: 31st May 1962- Gareth 'Taff' Jones

Israel. Shortly before midnight SS Oberststurmbannfuhrer Otto Adolph Eichmann was executed by hanging. Eichmann was born in Solingen, Germany on 19th March 1906, the eldest of five children.

In 1913 the Eichmann family moved to Linz in Austria. Eichmann attended Linz High School but apart from playing the violin and participating in sports, he had a poor school performance. Adolph Hitler had attended the same school seventeen years earlier! After leaving college (without a degree) he joined his father's company working as a salesclerk between 1927 and 1933.

1st April 1932, Eichmann joined the Austrian branch of the (NSDAP) Nazi Party and seven months later enrolled into the SS with responsibility for guarding the party

headquarters in Linz. In 1933 Eichmann lost his job and the Nazi Party was outlawed in Austria, these events forced the decision to return to Germany where the Nazis were now in power. In 1934, Eichmann requested a transfer to the *Sicherheitsdienst* (SD), the SS security service and began to study and report on Jewish organisations. During this time Eichmann befriended a Jewish Hebrew teacher immersing himself in Jewish literature and learning a little Hebrew and Yiddish thereby gaining a reputation within the SD as an expert in Jewish matters eventually becoming the SD adviser on Jewish affairs. In 1935 Eichmann married, Vera Liebl (another fanatic Nazi, she died 1997), with whom he had four sons.

In March 1938, Austria was annexed to Germany in the *Anschluss* and Eichmann was appointed later that year to head the Central Agency for Jewish Emigration in Vienna. With the outbreak of war, Eichmann returned to Germany to command the Reich Central Office for Jewish Emigration working under SS Obergruppenfuhrer Reinhard Heydrich, head of the SD. From December 1939 Eichmann was responsible for the transportation of Jews to the Central Government (part of German occupied Poland). At the infamous Wannsee Conference in January 1942, Eichmann drafted a list of the number of Jews resident in the various European countries. He also prepared and distributed the official minutes of the meeting. Under Eichmann's supervision, the deportations began immediately, and he remained active, especially in Hungary, throughout the war in deporting Europe's Jews to their deaths. Eichmann claimed to have coined the phrase "The Final Solution".

After the war, Eichmann was high on the Allies list of "Most Wanted" and was captured by American forces. Eichmann was using forged papers that identified him as Otto Eckmann, his real first name and a similar sounding surname! The evidence given against Eichmann at the Nuremberg trials in 1946 forced Eichmann to find a new name and work oversees. He was given documents in the name of Ricardo Klement (by the Nazi sympathiser, Bishop Hudal, in Rome). On the basis of these papers, the International Red Cross Committee gave Eichmann documents that allowed him to emigrate to Argentina.

Eichmann was eventually tracked to Argentina by the Israeli secret service, MOSSAD, where he was kidnapped and brought to Israel for trial. Appeals for clemency were dismissed and after execution the body was immediately cremated, and the ashes taken aboard an Israeli Patrol Vessel. They were thrown into the Mediterranean Sea outside Israeli territorial waters.

The famous Nazi hunter, Simon Wiesenthal, was allowed to take credit for finding Eichmann to take focus away from the MOSSAD agents who had abducted him. The death penalty in Israel was abolished in 1954 however, two people have been sentenced to death, Eichmann is the only execution. John Demjanjuk, a Ukrainian guard at Treblinka death camp known as "Ivan the Terrible", was sentenced to death in 1988, this was subsequently overturned by the Supreme Court in 1993.

Beryl's Bookworms – Sue Johns

We enjoyed another lively discussion this month courtesy of Betty at Waterman Farm with sumptuous cake! Oh – and the Book....!

On the Black Hill is a tale of identical twin brothers who grow up on a farm in rural Wales, never marry and never leave home, from the

beginning of the 20th Century to the 1980s. They work the rough soil and sleep, live and breathe together as only twins can, (and we had a twin in our midst who was able to corroborate this!) touched only occasionally by the advances of the twentieth century. It was interesting to have the experiences of a few of us with farming connections, who can remember, and not so long ago, farmers living in this area who were so wrapped up in the day to day sheer time consuming hard work of caring for livestock and cultivating ground, that the world seemed to completely pass them by.

We all agreed that the book conjured up vivid imagery of the Welsh countryside in all the diverse weather conditions. Equally memorable were the many character depictions – so many of 'everyday country folk,' where cleverly, in a few words, Chatwin could bring a person to life.

The descriptions of the treatment of Conscientious Objectors during WW1 caused much discussion.

We touched on Bruce Chatwin as a person; someone who'd clearly led a privileged, colourful life and who suffered an untimely death — yet he really did manage to capture the true essence of rural life, and from the standpoint of the sheer hard grind of everyday manual work in a small community.

Some of us found it a blissful page turner – and others found it harder to get into. A minority considered it too mundane. The consensus, however, was that despite the seemingly tragic tale, with its hints of hope, we had all been transported to a different place – true escapism, as great books should! One of our higher scorers with an average of 4.2.

Annual Parish Community Meeting

Your Annual Parish Community meeting took place on Wednesday 10th April and 4 members of the public attended. The guest speakers from South West Water delivered a brief and very informative presentation responding to questions we had sent in advance. Their slides can be seen on our website. Of particular interest are the signposts they gave us to useful resources, and these also will be uploaded onto our website.

They responded to 3 additional questions:

Exporting water - They are increasing their water sources and making use of china clay pits in Cornwall to increase water supply during dry periods. SWW does not export water to other parts of the country at present.

Invasive species – The main species is Himalayan Balsam. SWW has a legal requirement to manage outbreaks on their own land and are not averse to working with other groups and organisations to manage it in neighbouring areas.

SWW staffing - In response to the question whether human resources were sufficient to take on the extra work over the coming years. SWW confirmed that there would be use of contractors and internal recruitment for project management and quality control.

Questions from the Public and Matters Arising from Previous Meetings

- We were asked if, in the light of our healthy financial situation, we would consider completing the work needed to make access to the Post Office accessible. This will be considered at our May meeting.
- We also agreed to contact Open Reach regarding the excess cable left at the base of various telegraph poles in the village.
- In response to pavement concerns at Bittaford we will contact Devon County Council to ask if they can do anything regarding the condition of the footpath at the western end of Bittaford leading to Ivybridge. There is a particular stretch between the pavement opposite the Village Hall and the Clay Factory where grass and soil has encroached onto the pavement making it very narrow and dangerous.
- In the same vein we will ask Devon County Council to consider installing a drop-kerb on the pavement opposite the Village Hall entrance to allow mobile scooter users to cross the road to a wider pavement to prevent them having to use the very narrow pavement (particularly outside the Toll House) on Bittaford Terrace. The current drop-down kerb is frequently blocked by parked vehicles, and we ask people to be aware of others when parking vehicles.
- Vision obstruction for motorists exiting Shute Lane and Green Lane onto the B3123 – there are a range of factors contributing to this problem and we will consult with Devon County Council to see if there are any possible solutions
- A member of the public has expressed an interest in assisting with pot-hole repairs. We will send the individual details of the Road Warden scheme and, should they be interested in training for and taking on the role of Road Warden and recruiting and managing a volunteer team, we would consider supporting them by entering into the agreement with DCC but this is not currently a role any of the Councillors can take on.
- We had received a request to raise the ground next to the post box to improve accessibility. This is not something we can take on without permission and we will contact the Post Office to discuss any options.

Planning

- 1. It has been brought to our attention that we made an error in the April Newsletter report regarding the planning appeal against the decision to refuse planning permission for the erection of a self-build 2-bed bungalow with parking at Wrangaton. It was actually Dartmoor National Park planning authority and not South Hams District Council who refused the application. We apologise for this mistake.
- 2. We considered 2 planning applications at our April meeting:
- <u>a) 0107/24</u> First floor story extension to the side, 5 Leigh Close, Bittaford, We noted the external staircase and agreed to respond neutrally to Dartmoor National Park and comment that they may wish to check that this complies with their current policy on short-term letting.
- <u>b) 0948/24/LBC</u> Hill House Ugborough Listed Building Consent for 'Phase 3' Internal alterations along with a single window replacement We supported this application providing the South Hams District Council conservation officer approves it.
- 3. We had received the following decisions made by South Hams District Council and Dartmoor National Park since our last meeting:
- a) 182/24/LBC Hill House Ugborough. Listed building consent for necessary repair works to the roof covering & rear chimney Conditional Approval and Listed Building Consent for 'Phase 2' necessary structural repair works to the roof, roof trusses & first floor structures Conditional Approval
- b) 3678/23/FUL Higher Witchcombe Farm, Ugborough, Use of a mobile home to act as a temporary agricultural workers dwelling Refusal
- 4. We had received communication from North Huish PC concerning a 2021 planning application that may have been breached and have referred the matter to SHDC Planning Enforcement.

Update on Ugborough West

- 1. The ongoing debate about speeding etc in the west-side of the Parish continues to gain a pace:
- The south side of David's Lane now has a 20mph speed limit from the junction of the new site office and the top before the junction with Exeter Road;
- The "horse" signs have still not appeared back on the national speed limit post at Davey's Cross;

- An increase in speeding along the entire section of Exeter Road from the west of the Parish to the east, especially through those residential areas designated 30mph has been noticed;
- 2.The flooding at Rue St Pierre appears to have abated given the last few months work, however the continued rains have now opened up more recently filled and new potholes along the entire section of Exeter Road, particularly as discussed last time the mini-roundabout at the junction of St Peters Way;
- 3. Someone has, dangerously turned the 30/National Speed limit sign around as you approach Fore Street from the A3121 just passed the junction with Parsonage Lane.

Finance

- 1. We are pleased to grant fund South Hams Citizens Advice £400 this year and thank them for their excellent work and support for members of our community.
- 2. We will be purchasing a new noticeboard for Wrangaton and apologise for any inconvenience caused recently by the absence of notices as the existing noticeboard cannot be opened.

Highways

- 1. We have finally received the proposed design for the long- awaited bus shelter at Wrangaton Sidings Cross and have confirmed out agreement of the design. Hopefully the work will not be further delayed.
- 2. We discussed the implications for the roadworks to widen the A3121 south of the Sign of the Owl junction. Although we agreed that this was potentially going to create a lot of problems in our narrow lanes, we have accepted that there were no alternatives for DCC. We have, however, asked DCC to consider the use of traffic lights in the 2nd phase in order to keep the Sign of the Owl Cross open

Climate Emergency and sustainable Ugborough

1. Carbon Zero event:

We thank the 17 helpers at the event. 17 people attended which was slightly disappointing as there was a lot of really useful information pulled together. We will be creating a section on the website to signpost people to support and advice as and when needed.

2. We have budgeted £250 (in the first instance) to establish an Invasive Species project run by Cllr May. A series of Balsam Bashing events are taking place starting 15th May. For further information go to our website and if you would like to help out, please contact the clerk.

Bittaford Play Area Update

Work to remove the shelter and re-seed in the top area has been delayed by the weather. The gate closing mechanism and see-saw alignment will be dealt with this month and work is in hand to investigate whether there is a problem with the drainage from the highway above the play area that caused the footpath damage. Dartmoor National Park have repaired the damage to the path and done some remedial work on a pipe that might help prevent the flooding re-occurring.

There is a meeting on 19th April to agree the lease and it is hoped that the work will take place during the May half-term




