#### The Ugborough Wassail 2024 -Graham Gilbert

It was Friday afternoon in the orchard and, strangely, it wasn't raining. The trees were quietly enjoying the gentle breeze and exchanging the odd message via the Wood-Wide-Web. Some of the younger trees were playing Ori and the Will of the Wisps (a rootleg version acquired on the blackthorn market) when a warning went out that a few humans were Doing Things in the adjacent field; remarkably similar Things to the same time last year. Wassailing Things.

The following afternoon, and in no time at all, actually about an hour or so thus time there definitely was, a marquee was erected, followed by a large gazebo. Tables and chairs, gas hobs, and other paraphernalia appeared, lights strung around the field and about the marquee and gazebo, mulled cider and apple juice were heated up, then People began to arrive. Some came bearing wassail cakes, apple cakes, apple flapjacks, focaccia and bread.

Musicians assembled, instruments tuned, fingers warmed up. Then the wassail began. "Waes Hael" rang out, and UFOlk played three wassail tunes accompanied by singers from the village and members of the South Devon Wassail Singers. The Singers then sang a couple more songs before the Master of Ceremonies and the Wassail Queens led a procession into the orchard to bless three chosen trees with words from the Apple Tree Wassail. Shotguns were fired together with much banging of pots and general noise in order to drive out any evil spirits daft enough to be still hanging around.

Then the People left the orchard for more mulled cider or hot soup to be consumed around the warmth of the fire pits. The Singers sang more wassail songs. Children played. Eventually the soup and cider had been drunk, the food eaten, the cold began to insinuate itself beneath the layers of clothing. Time to go.

Everyone agreed that a good time was had, and that after a good harvest in the autumn, attributed to the effects of the last Wassail, another would surely follow. The orchard settled down to a chilly night happy in the knowledge that an awful lot of People cared enough about them to give them their blessings in the traditional way. It meant a lot.

**February 19<sup>th</sup>** Birthday of Andrew, the Duke of York

<u>Ugfest 2023</u> was held on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> June at Hillhead Farm, Ugborough. Thank you to everyone who helped make the event such a success!

About 480 people joined us to enjoy local music, food and drink. We had amazing music from Paul Sice, Mimi Mann, Groundrush and The Longfaces, rounded off by the brilliant DJ Typo.

Ugfest is now an independent organisation (charity commission status pending) headed by a small committee and supported by a gang of enthusiastic volunteers. We are grateful to the generosity of so many, with particular mention to Hillhead Farm for hosting us; to Alfie and the wider Hutcheon/Johns family for preparing the barns; to Dunwell Farm for the event equipment and expertise; and to all the musicians - all of these declined a fee.

We were kindly supported by local businesses: shout out to our sponsor Marchard Petit; our food vendors Kid Hod Thai and The Wonky Moose Pizza Company; and our sound/light from Blue Thunder. Most Pilsner and Ale came from Social Enterprise Company Ivybridge Brewing. All the other beer was produced within 15 miles of the barn. The Cider selection was also local and delicious! We had merchandise for the first time this year by Devon Tees. Our main charities each received £1000:

Erme Valley RDA – We are delighted to support Peggy, Sophie and the wider team for the amazing opportunities they provide for local disabled riders at The Brook in Ugborough. They plan to put the money towards supporting access to horses for local school children.

Gifted Women- A small charity supporting women in Tavistock and Plymouth areas to find employment. They aim to empower women experiencing multiple disadvantage (often a combination of intersecting barriers including homelessness, substance misuse, contact with the criminal justice system, abuse and exploitation and removal of children into care) to move into employment so they can build a better future for themselves and their families. We are delighted to also report that via Ugfest advertising, an Ugborough connected business contacted Gifted Women and a work placement has been arranged.

Mary's Meals –Katie, the South West's Officer for Mary's Meals, is an Ivybridge Rugby Club parent. Mary's Meals serves nutritious school meals to children living in some of the world's poorest countries. The promise of a good meal attracts these hungry children into the classroom, giving them the energy to learn and hope for a better future. More than 67 million primary school-age children are out of school around the world. In order to survive, they have to work or beg. The Ugfest donation will provide 52 children with a meal in their place of education for an entire year.

We were also able to donate £4000 to charities within our community: The Ugborough Newsletter, Ugborough Church, Friends of Ugborough School, Ugborough and Bittaford Pre-School, Ugborough Village Hall, Ugborough School Junior Ten Tors Teams, Greener Ugborough Parish and we have dedicated some money to supporting the work to gain access to a green space/playing field.

#### Historical Nugget: Taff Jones

23<sup>rd</sup> January 1934 – Britain, Sir Edward Elgar OM GCVO, the great English composer died at the age of 76 and was buried next to his wife at St Wulstan's RC Church in Little Malvern, Worcestershire.

Elgar received no formal musical training except from his father whom he succeeded as a church organist in Worcester. He gained early experience as a band master at Worcester County Lunatic Asylum (everyone has to start somewhere) and later became conductor of the London Symphony Orchestra.

Elgar first gained international recognition with the *Enigma Variations* followed by the *Dream of Gerontius*. His best-known pieces of work in Britain are possibly his *Pomp and Circumstance* marches played at the Proms each year. However, Elgar's reputation fluctuated as times and tastes changed, Richard Strauss, Sibelius and others compared him to the greatest English composer since Henry Purcell. In later years, Herbert von Karajan called his *Enigma Variations* "second hand Brahms". By the 1960s Edwardian music was not as severely criticised and Elgar's music became more fashionable.

During his lifetime Elgar was awarded many honours, both in this country and abroad. A statue of him can be found on Worcester High Street and another statue of him with his bicycle can be found in Hereford. His image was could also be found on the obverse of the  $\pm 20$  note 1999-2007 (the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of his birth – 1857).

# Valentine's Day Thoughts - Gerald Arnold

With Spring coming, an article on St Valentine is timely.

Legend has it (though there is no real evidence to substantiate this), that St Valentine's Day originated in the Roman Festival of Lupercalia, which occurred at this time of the year, and the Martyrdom of a certain St Valentine. In fact, there were two St Valentines martyred in Rome in 269 - 270 AD, about the same time as the Lupercalian festival, who have generally become confused - one was the Bishop of Terni and the other a priest or physician who was also invoked by sufferers of leprosy.

The Roman Lupercalian fertility rites in mid-February were held in honour of the Goddess Juno Februa (and, according to some, Pan). On that day, boys would draw by lot the names of unmarried girls for courtship. 14<sup>th</sup> February was probably also chosen for St Valentine's Day because, in folklore, it is the day on which birds choose their mates. Two Bluebirds which figure on so many Valentine cards therefore represent lovers bound together in spirit from this day forth.

Valentine's Day is for sending cards, love messages, poems and romantic presents. The idea of sending sentimental cards to loved ones is a Victorian one, and they developed it into a fine art, with ornate cards decorated with real flowers, lace, bird feathers and even hearts of spun glass. Cards declined in popularity for a while (perhaps because the taste for coarse, lewd cards became as pronounced in late Victorian times as is often seems today), but they now enjoy a revival.

In the 18<sup>th</sup> century, lovers in Lyme Regis area would have their initials entwined together into a piece of lace. Lyme Regis lace was of a very fine quality and would have been quite slow to work. How many romances were finished before the lace was ? ! (I am grateful to R.E.H. for all the background information and some of the ideas.)

#### 2 Members of the public attended our meeting on 10<sup>th</sup> January 2024 Questions from the Public and Matters Arising from Previous Meetings

**Bus shelter in Ugborough Village** - We have received a comment that the is very untidy. There is currently no one who has responsibility for looking after the shelter. If anyone would like to take this on, please do contact the clerk. Thank you to everyone who contributes to the book swap in the shelter and just a reminder to please only leave books that are in good condition and when there is room on the shelves.

**Paint on the road in Ugborough Village** - We are conscious that this is very unsightly and are still looking to see if we can get this cleaned up

Bus shelter at Wrangaton – we are still chasing and waiting for a reply regarding this.

Bus shelter at the entrance to Bloor Estate - we are looking into the possible sources of funding.

**Light on Conduit** – a site meeting has been agreed with SHDC and the light company, but no date has been arranged although we hope to resolve this matter as soon as possible.

**Public toilets** – We cannot take on the toilets under the current conditions being stipulated by South Hams District Council. We will be writing to the Leader of Council to request that SHDC re-open the toilets at Bittaford and Ugborough.

**Dog fouling in Ugborough Village** – Cllr Dewynter is following up on the problem with South Hams District Council

**Donkey Lane flooding** – we have reported this to Devon County Council, and it is on their schedule but is not currently a priority whilst main highways continue to be cleared after the recent bad weather.

**Finance and HR** We have now agreed our budget for 2024 - 2025 and this is available on our website. The precept demand for 2024 - 2025 will be £37,150. This means that the band D tax rate will be £33.12, and this is a small increase of £1.58 per annum.

**Bittaford Play Area** We have been working hard to ensure the play area meets all the necessary safety standards and to seek a solution for the repair of the path damaged during storm Ciaran in November. The following work will be taking place over the next month or so:

Clearance of the fallen tree and tidying up of surrounding undergrowth, addition of a selfclosing mechanism to the pedestrian gate, removal of the damaged wooden shelter and flooring and repair of the path through the park. (There will be temporary work done in the first instance by Dartmoor National Park Authority whilst a permanent solution is agreed.) We apologise in advance for any inconvenience this may cause as various areas of the park will not be available at various times.

**Annual defibrillator training.** FREE training will take place on Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> February at 7pm in Ugborough Village Hall. Please contact the clerk if you would like to attend (the session will end at approx. 9pm) We would urge you to come along and familiarise yourself with this life-saving equipment. 




#### Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison


After a cold start, December was a very wet month. Wet and windy. There were 3 named storms - Elin (9th), Fergus (10th) and Gerrit (27th) - during the month as a succession of Atlantic Low-pressure systems swept across the UK. We thankfully escaped the worst effects of these, but our wettest day on the 7th caused flooding in East Devon. At Shellwood Hill I recorded 299.5mm (just over 11<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>") during the month which was almost 50% above the months average of 203mm, and second only to December 2012 in my fourteen-year record.

Over 2023 as a whole I recorded a total 1898 mm (approx. 75") of rain at Shellwood Hill only slightly less than the extremely wet year of 2012 - and which compares to my annual average of 1519mm. It was a funny old year of weather - but then every year feels like that these days: In 2023 we had our driest February...our wettest March...our warmest June...and then a succession of mild, wet and windy Autumn/Winter Storms - which also saw the lowest ever November atmospheric pressure recorded in Plymouth. At a national level, it looks like 2023 will be the UK's second warmest (after 2022) since records began in 1884. Globally 2023 is set to be the warmest year on the record since 1850, with record (high) sea surface temperatures and (low) Antarctic sea ice.
