The Chancellor of the Diocese of Exeter has now issued his Faculty to allow the internal improvement work in the Church to commence. The Parochial Church Council has agreed to commission a local contractor to carry out the work, and it is hoped that this will begin shortly after Easter. Additionally the Church Council has agreed to commission consultants to advise on a suitable and effective heating system for the Church. This month's recipe is from *Pauline Morrish*

#### **Cheese Straws**

4ozs Plain Flour,      3ozs Grated Full Flavour Cheddar  
2ozs Margarine,      1 Egg Yolk,      Cayenne Pepper (to taste)

Mix the flour and margarine together.

Add grated cheese and cayenne pepper. Mix, then add egg yolk.

Roll out to flat sheet and cut as required.

Cook for approx 12 mins @180c in fan oven until golden brown.

### **Ugborough Village Hall** *Stafford Williams (Secretary)*

We were very fortunate to receive grant funding to complete the renovation of the wall at the side of the Hall. This was obtained from the Devon Grassroots scheme of the Devon Community Foundation. We had also bid for a sound system to be installed, but that bid was unsuccessful. Such grants enable the committee to complete significant projects that would prove difficult to fund from normal income.

Work is also underway to refurbish the facilities in the male toilet and we are looking at options for inclusion of another WC in the area. Furthermore, the area beneath the kitchen hatch will shortly have a cupboard and work surface fitted to provide additional storage as well as much needed working space.

Advance notification has been received that the Hall will be required for use as a polling station on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> June 2009 and will not be available to other users from 6.30 am until 10.00 pm that day.

## History Corner *Alan Yates*

### **Skimmetting**

In a recently shown TV episode of "Midsomer Murders", during a village fair, a man sitting backwards on a horse and with a bag over his head, was chased by "skimmetters" - women in costume wielding cooking ladles.

In his 1892 book "The Old Stone Crosses of the Dartmoor Borders" , William Crossing included the following:-

The ancient custom of "skimmetting" or "riding to water" was observed at Ugborough as recently as the autumn of last year (1891). Mr. J. R. Chanter in a paper on North Devon Customs and Superstitions, read before the members of the Devonshire Association at Barnstaple in 1867, refers to the custom, which he states consisted of "a burlesque procession, in ridicule of a man whose wife has been faithless to him, and likewise of a tame husband submitting to be henpecked and beaten by his wife". But the Ugborough case led to the appearance at the Plympton police court of several of those who took part in the demonstration. Those engaged in the skimmetting were drawing a cart about, playing a concertina and beating tin pans being followed by a large crowd; while seated in the cart were two of the party disguised, one as a woman. Notwithstanding the explanation of the defendants' solicitor that the alleged disturbance was merely the observance of a custom formerly not uncommon and difficult as it is to see who could be inconvenienced by a temporary obstruction in an out-of-the-way place like Ugborough, the participators in the skimmetting riding were considered to have broken the law and were accordingly fined.

(Editor's note- other tales from the dark nooks and crannies of Ugborough history are very welcome.)

## 15-0 AND NOT OUT AVONVALE TENNIS & CROQUET CLUB

This year, Avon Vale Tennis & Croquet Club (at Avonwick) is celebrating 150 years as a sports club in the South Hams. In May 1859 a number of local men decided that they would form an Archery Club at the Kingsbridge Road Hotel (subsequently The Wounded Soldier from 1972 and then The Coach House Inn), Wrangaton. This was the beginning of the Avon Vale Club which has been at Avonwick since June 1870. In 1875 the Avon Vale Archery Club changed its name to the Avon Vale Club extending its sporting activities to include Badminton, Cricket, Lawn Tennis and Skating and is one of the oldest tennis clubs in the country.

Today the Club is thriving with 5 grass tennis courts, 1 hard court and a croquet lawn, having survived the ups and downs of the intervening war years and economic problems. As part of the Club's 150<sup>th</sup> celebrations, the club is reviewing its archives across the whole 150 years and is looking to renew contact with past members of the club, whether from many years ago or more recently. The Parish Council budget for the next financial year, together with its  
portion of your Council Tax, was the main item of discussion at the January  
Parish Council Meeting. Bearing in mind the recession, Councillors decided to  
keep the precept at £11,500 - the same as last year. Major expenditure is  
planned over the next year to level the playing field at Moorhaven with a view  
to making it more widely available for team sports and Bittaford Community  
Hall will also benefit from £2000 grant funding towards its extension. With  
these spending plans, there is likely to be a shortfall in the budget, which will  
be met from reserves.

The planning application for the racing arena at Cutwellcombe Farm, Avonwick  
was again raised at the beginning of the meeting, when members of the public  
asked whether there had been any progress in clarifying the outstanding

planning issues. Your SHDC Councillor Fielden (who chairs the Development Control Committee) confirmed that enforcement action would proceed and that the application would not reach Committee stage before the noise and other pollution issues had been assessed. It was suggested that local residents could carry out traffic counts to support their grounds for objection.

SHDC Cllr Lawrence reported on another planning application which has raised considerable local feeling: planning permission has been granted for the office development on the site of the former Woodpecker Inn, subject to the Highways Agency accepting traffic movement management. The Highways Agency is concerned about the safety of the A38 junction and anyone concerned about the traffic implications of the development should contact them direct.

Only one planning application was received, for the alterations and extension at Meadowside, Bittaford, to which no objections were raised.

Progress on the two main projects currently being pursued by the Parish Council proved to be frustratingly slow. The Dartmoor National Park Authority had confirmed that planning permission was required to level the playing field at Moorhaven, which would considerably delay the process. Second, the production of the Parish Plan Questionnaire may be delayed because SHDC and the Devon Rural Community Council have yet to give any commitment to process the Housing Needs element of the questionnaire.

The Fare Car service, which serves Ugborough, is now being run by Ivy Cabs, with regular journeys to Ivybridge town centre & station and Tesco Lee Mill at a fare of £2 each way. Anyone may use the service, simply by calling 01752 895658 at least the day before the journey.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> February, which you are welcome to attend.
