The belief seems to be that we have been consistently careful in the South West, and that coupled with a relatively less dense population has contributed to the lower infection and death rates here than in other more populated areas – and long may it continue!


On a personal note.... I was hugely honoured and humbled to be nominated for the first Community Award for a meal in The Ship - donated by a generous benefactor.

Beryl's Bookworms – Joan Fletcher

This month's book was Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens. The book is by an American author and zoologist who spent many years researching animal behaviour in Africa before returning to the States. Where the Crawdads Sing is Delia Owens' first novel. By December 2019 it had sold 4.5 million copies and sold more print copies than any other adult title in that year.

The author herself describes the book as 'a mystery, a love story, and a courtroom drama, but it is primarily about self-reliance, survival, and how isolation affects human behaviour.'

The book follows Kya Clark as she grows up in the 1950s and 60s alone in a shack in the swamplands of North Carolina after being abandoned by her family. She knows only nature and all her reference points come from her surroundings.

We liked the way the author described the atmosphere of the swamp and the natural environment that provides Kya with the skills she needs to survive. However, a few of us were not so sure a 10-year-old would be able to survive alone in this environment. Most of us loved the book but others found the second half, where a young man has died suspiciously in the swamp and the ensuing court case, not very believable. Our scores ranged from 2.5 to 5 with an overall average of 4 out of 5.

Our next book is To Calais in Ordinary Time by James Meek.

Lost in translation. Czech mate. - Ian McClure

It is a truth universally to be acknowledged that it is easier to translate or interpret from and to a language if you are qualified in it. This should be a statement of the blinding obvious. But here are some examples of when this has not been the case:

Some years ago a colleague of mine, a fellow naval Russian interpreter, was sent a translation by the Ministry of Defence. 'There's only one problem' he said. 'It's written in Japanese. I don't speak Japanese'. Came the immortal reply: 'But you're an interpreter, aren't you?'

There have been two occasions when I have been asked to work in languages which I do not speak. Funnily enough they both involve Slovak, which is similar to Czech but subtly different. The first was in Bosnia, when I was acting as the Interpreter/Liaison Officer for the UN Protection Force. There was a problem with a temporary bridge: the Slovak Engineering Battalion 'owned' the bridge, but it was in the territory administered by the Spanish. As a 'Linguist' I was sent to sort it out, with the Sergeant Major, who spoke passable English. Well, my Spanish could be described as 'schoolboy' and my Slovak non-existent although I do have a smattering of Czech.

After some hilarious hours (when we were given a cup of the most disgusting coffee I have ever tasted — made with acorns I think) we did manage to solve the problem, a good old British compromise which allowed northbound traffic to use the bridge on Mondays Wednesdays and Fridays and southbound traffic on the other days.

The other occasion was just a few years ago when a friend of mine asked me to interpret at the wedding of his son who was marrying a Slovak girl. She spoke fluent English but her parents (particularly her mother) spoke only Slovak. Luckily, I did not have to translate any speeches, it was informal chitchat but still quite testing using only my Czech phrasebook. Particularly as from time to time the bride's mother gave me an accusing look and said, 'that's a Czech word'. Eventually I looked despairingly at the bride's father and said 'do you speak Russian? If so, do you mind if we do? I was much relieved when he agreed, as he may well have been insulted and horrified at the mention of a former hated Warsaw Pact language — sensitivities still run high in Slavia — and from then all was well and the problem solved.

So, if you are ever asked to interpret, make sure you speak the language!



<u>Your Stars Tonight</u>. It is surprisingly comfortable in my garden tool shed although the lawnmower does have knobbly bits sticking out in the wrong place when I try and settle down for the night. Food is a challenge, but I am coping with a diet of wild strawberries, raspberries and high-quality bird food. If things go on much longer, I suppose I could survive on a diet of goldfish and courgettes. But I am hoping to be forgiven before I have to try

braised hedgehog.

It was all a ghastly mistake and caused by my excessive poetic licence. When I proclaimed that "She's a great hairy beauty and seeing her was like an unexpected meeting with an old girlfriend that I have not seen for twenty five years — and realising I have forgotten how beautiful she was" — I thought it was obvious I was talking about Comet Neowise in comparison to the only other comet I can remember seeing, which was Hale Bopp back in 1997.

To be honest, Comet Neowise was a complete surprise to the astronomical community – it must have crept in on the wrong side of the sun and when it popped into view early in July it was an extraordinary sight. I first saw it from the top of the hill on the ridge road and looking north over Dartmoor on 10th July. Patience was required as it took a long time to emerge from the twilight just below the Plough constellation and it was not until midnight that it was easily visible through binoculars. And once you knew where it was it was easy to spot by eye – particularly if you took advantage of peripheral vision by visually flicking left to right. The tail was enormous spanning the equivalent of four moon widths and it had a magical feeling as it hung in the sky looking so ghost like and ethereal.

And the walk back down the hill was magical too – we have a small colony of glow worms who have set up home in the hedgerows below Toby Cross. If you have not seen the comet yet, then time is limited as it will fade rapidly in the next couple of weeks. And who knows what the glow worms will do – but I think they are passed their peak glowing season as well.

And what else is going on in August up there? Warm clear nights are always good for sitting back and looking out for meteors. During the first half of August there is a slow build up to the Perseids meteor shower which peaks after midnight on 12th and 13th August. The Perseids meteors have a comet connection – they are the debris left behind by Comet Swift Tuttle and every year the Earth ploughs through this celestial garbage and incinerates it to give high altitude pyrotechnics. As always there are two potential spoilers – the weather and the moon. The first is something you can't do anything about if you are doing staycation. However the glare of the moon can be reduced – find an east facing wall, hedge or fence to block out the moonlight and look towards the constellation of Perseus over the eastern horizon (just below the "W" of Cassiopeia). Then relax and enjoy the celestial fireworks – on a good year they can peak at over one a minute – with the occasional fireball. All that, plus a huge Jupiter, fainter Saturn and a salmon red Mars hovering in the south.

Who could ask for more? Maybe a return to matrimonial harmony would be nice as well.

As well as reflecting on our own lifestyle changes made during lockdown, G-UP has also been considering which of the broader 'accidental positives' might be worth trying to sustain locally as society begins to re-open and

we look to a sustainable future, and the main topic of conversation has been all things transport and traffic:

Recently Graham Wilson, Chair of the PL:21 Transition Town Initiative, presented to G-UP the *Active Street Design Strategy* travel study which sustainable transport charity Sustrans has developed. This proposal shows how paths and streets within Ivybridge and the corridor between South Brent and Plymouth could be adapted for walking and cycling so that everyone may feel confident and safe. More can be found about this project, which G-UP is supporting, at **PL21.weebly.com**

Meanwhile, in light of Covid-19, the government has tasked councils with creating new cycle ways and wider pavements for physical distancing. This in turn could make for safer roads locally for pedestrians and cyclists, and the tool that Devon County Council is using to determine its planning is **widenmypath.com**. Please could we encourage you to add your concerns/suggestions relating to local road safety to this accessible website - even if you simply agree with other existing comments it could positively impact planning decisions for our Parish.

The July Parish Council Meeting was again held remotely on Zoom — members of the public are welcome to attend, and the link is given on the agenda. All the District, County & DNP Councillors 'attended' and it was only at the end of the meeting that I realised SHDC Cllr Abbott was still 'locked down' in Swansea — although he has now been able to return home.

Alternative uses for the former public toilets in Bittaford and Ugborough could be one step closer by registering them as an Asset of Community Value – something that we will be discussing at our August Meeting. A number of community organisations, including the Parish Council, can nominate the asset to be registered for at least 5 years. Then, if the owner wishes to sell the asset, he must give the right of first refusal to community organisations to buy on the open

market. Already, one village group has already expressed interest in buying the toilets, which it could convert for the benefit of the community.

Planning applications – with recommendations in **bold**:

- 1. Householder application to create additional accommodation in the roof space, add a dormer to the rear of the house and make environmental improvements to the building fabric at 5 Undertown Ugborough Ref 1600/20/HHO **Neutral**
- 2. Householder application for internal refurbishment, conversion of garage and remedial works including relocation of Oil Tank, external replacement of UPVC glazed porch with traditional timber framed lean to, cladding of garage, creation of entrance canopy and glazed infill, and removal of translucent glazing with decked roof at Forder Barns Ugborough Ref 1522/20/HHO Neutral
- 3. Lawful development certificate for existing occupation of building as single dwelling house and associated use of amenity land for domestic purposes at Wadadli Lodge Bittaford Ref 1663/20/CLE_No evidence to support or refute the claim

VE & VJ Day commemorations were sadly missed due to Covid. Now the Parish Council wishes to recognise those events by planting two trees in the burial ground, together with a plaque, which will provide a lasting memorial. However, the tree planting ceremony may have to wait until more than 6 people can gather together!

Ugborough playground improvements are to be discussed with SHDC, who owns the playground. The Parish Council will be contributing its S106 allocation towards the improvements, which include new play equipment. G-UP are keen to be involved and are proposing a holistic design process involving permaculture principles.

The Bloor Homes housing development in Filham lies within the Parish, and in addition to being involved in the planning process, the Parish Council has also been consulted on details like the bus shelter design and naming the 6 roads in the scheme. After consulting the History Society, the Parish Council has suggested the old field names — not only are they attractive names, but they provide a little historical context.

Footpaths and their maintenance were discussed at the meeting. Footpaths warden Paul McFadden will be reminding landowners of their responsibilities with regard to footpaths – for more details, have a look at https://www.gov.uk/guidance/public-rights-of-way-landowner-responsibilities.

Did you know that many historic routes (pre 1949) will be extinguished if they are not formally recorded on the Definitive Plan by 2026? The Ramblers Association is leading the way in recording these historic paths, and you can help them by going to https://www.ramblers.org.uk/get-involved/campaign-with-us/dont-lose-your-way-2026.aspx

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held remotely on Wednesday 5th August, starting at the earlier time of 7 p.m., when South Dartmoor Community Energy will present its plans for an eco-affordable housing scheme at North Filham. Agenda and minutes will be displayed on the noticeboards and website.

As you might expect with each of these services there will be a number of new guidelines to follow but be assured we have taken into account all the government and Church of England advice to make our Church worship as safe as possible for everyone.

However it is important to stress that if yourself or anyone in your household is isolating due to possible or confirmed COVID-19 or because you have been requested to by NHS test and trace you should not attend services in person.

It is also still the case that those shielding should not attend places of worship indoors.

It is strongly advised that, as will be the case for many within our congregations, those at increased risk of severe disease from COVID-19, including those aged 70 and over, regardless of medical conditions, should continue to stay at home as much as possible and minimise contact with others outside their household.

For these and other reasons **the online services will continue to be accessible** for everyone each week.

The NHS Test and Trace forms an important part of managing the spread of the virus and helping us all return to normal life. To ensure this is as effective as possible it is imperative that, if you develop symptoms (a new continuous cough, a high temperature or a loss of, or a change of or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell) you arrange a test either via the *nhs.co.uk* website or by calling the testing phone line 119.

If you are struggling with your symptoms you can of course call 111 or 999 as is appropriate. If you test positive for COVID-19 the Test and Trace team will be in contact with you to establish who you have been in contact with; where and when. If you have attended a church service you can give them Revd. David's phone number (01548 821199) he will have access to all the details of those who signed into that service.

- Items will be collected and returned at the entrance of the mobile library. You won't be able to enter the vehicle to browse or choose for yourself.
