'Prize' Wildlife Lawns

Did you join in with Plantlife's annual #No Mow May campaign?

Email us your Wildlife lawn pictures, and we will be giving a prize for the best. (Deadline – 10^{th} June).

No Mow May is a national campaign that encourages people to experiment with not mowing their lawns until the end of May in order to boost the flowers and nectar available to pollinating

insects such as bees, butterflies and moths. It also allows spring flowers to set seed and plants to establish themselves in advance of the summer.

Here's how to mow for wildlife all year round:

- Mowing once every four weeks gives more pollen and nectar for pollinators.
- Leave areas of lawn uncut, don't cut it all in one go.
- Stop using weedkiller.

Bees to see in June

As well as the usual buff-tailed, white-tailed and common carder bumblebees, look out for Garden, Red-tailed and Tree bumblebees. You might be lucky enough to spot a Vestal

cuckoo bee too, searching for Buff-tailed nests to take over. They will kill the Buff-tailed queen and trick the workers into looking after the 'cuckoo' eggs.

The solitary red mason bees will be finishing, and the leafcutter bees will arrive. Look out for the female bees carrying a piece of leaf as big as herself clasped between her legs. Favourite leaves to cut are roses and lilac, or in my garden Cercis. If you see a bee with yellow spots along the side and a chunky body, it is the Wool Carder Bee. The females collect downy material from the underside of Lamb's Ear (*Stachys byzantina*), rolling it into a ball as big as herself, to line her nest. The males are very aggressive, defending flower patches to the death, with spikes under their abdomen.

Plants for Pollinators

Planting different flowers for different bees is particularly important this month when there can often be what's called a June gap. A lull in nectar and pollen supplies as spring flowers fade before summer ones burst into bloom. Try catmint (*Nepeta*) for short-tongued bees, and foxgloves, honeysuckle, comfrey, and thistles for long-tongued bees. The yellow flowers of Dyer's chamomile (*Anthemis tinctoria*) are great for all types of solitary bees, along with Geranium, and Viper's bugloss (*Echium vulgare*) Don't forget Lamb's Ear (*Stachys byzantina*) for the wool carder bees.

In waste-reduction related news, Refillability, the Ivybridge based refill shop, is starting a local delivery service which includes Ugborough, Bittaford and Wrangaton. Delivery days are Wednesday with orders to be placed by 4 p.m. on Tuesday via the website: https://refillability.shop. If you're out during delivery you can leave your bottles in a designated place (clearly marked with the contents you require in each).



Remember to keep recording all your sightings on i-Naturalist and the wildlife WhatsApp Group Chat. Sightings last month include Cardinal Beetles, Goldenrod Crab Spider, Wood Avens, small Copper, Snake-back spider, Grey Wagtail and Hummingbird

A wormery: the circle of life- Graham Wilson

Have you thought about your food waste? At home my wife and I bought a wormery several years ago. I think everyone who has a garden however big or small should have one. I have learned what food worms enjoy. They munch away at nearly everything but don't put in meat or lemon skins, etc. They love uncooked peelings, cooked leftovers, mouldy jam, tea leaves and used ground coffee. I discovered that they don't like tea bags, so we have ditched them and buy loose leaf tea. Ours are from Plymouth Tea Company.

As a family of two, the worms eat all our food waste and will eat more. Liquid fertiliser is produced in the tank below and we use this to feed our vegetable garden (especially good for tomatoes). I currently have 25 litres unused liquid fertilizer. The wormery waste turns into a dark compost and needs to be left to dry, before using in your garden.

We overcame increased food waste when visitors come to stay with us by buying a minicomposter. This has a grating under the food waste and liquid collecting chamber at the bottom. It gathers lots of liquid fertiliser in very quick time. The food rots down in about 14 days and can be thrown onto your compost heap.

Apart from this, we compost all our garden waste and hedge clippings go to create a bug hotel. We don't use our brown bin. Finally happy worms produce lots of babies and our wormery is much loved. That's my worm news.

Beryl's Bookworms – Sharon Hughes

Beryl's Bookworms were a depleted group this month, due mostly to a clash of holidays.

However, the absentees were set some homework, with most obliging by sending in their personal reviews of Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus.



The group then had the pleasure of hearing these and the fun of trying to work out who had written each one. Some were easily identifiable, with their much-known dislike of talking animals or lack of reality but not all were as predictable!

The story was set in the 1960's patriarchal Hastings Research Institute in America with Elizabeth Zott a female Chemist, navigating her way through sexism, sexual harassment and sexual assault. Zott faces blatant misogyny on a daily basis with her colleagues believing women have no place in science.

This may sound like a heavy read but with a genius comical dog narrating the story, a gifted daughter asking questions way beyond her years and Zott's dry unintended humour, it isn't!

The group were split in their thoughts about whether the author ever intended to cover the big topics in a serious way, or whether it was intended as a light humorous read with thought provoking themes . Some members of the group were definitely irritated by the exaggerated themes and disappointed in its flippancy. Although in the summing up nearly all admitted quite enjoying it and wanting to know what was going to happen next, even if it was totally unbelievable.

The average score worked out at 3 out of 5- a bit lower than the 4.35 from half a million reviews on Goodreads, so don't be put off by us!

Historical Nugget- Gareth (Taff) Jones

12th June 1903 - King Alexander and Queen Draga of Serbia were murdered in their bedroom in the early hours of the morning. A group of army officers, led by Colonel Misches and Colonel Mashin, a brother of the Queen's first husband, forced their way into the royal palace in Belgrade shooting the bodyguards.

The King and Queen were found hiding in a cupboard in their bedroom and shots were fired before their bodies were mutilated and disembowelled and thrown from the bedroom window. It is believed that the reason for the assassination was the King's plan to move the War School from Belgrade, but the causes of the Army's disaffection apparently ran deeper. There was a scandal when the King married Draga Mashin, as rumour had it that she had a promiscuous and shady past, but the King would not listen to advice and enraged the nation when they married.

The King succeeded to the throne in 1889 and managed to make himself unpopular by abolishing the liberal 1888 constitution and restoring the more conservative one of 1869. Alexander was 26 when he died, maybe he should have taken the advice of his seniors...

We had two meetings in May – The Annual Parish Council meeting followed by our ordinary May meeting. Two members of the public attended the meetings.

Annual Parish Council Meeting

The meeting started with the important business of electing a Chair and Vice-Chair for the next year. We voted in Cllrs Joan Fletcher and Tim Slater respectively for these 2 roles We agreed which Councillors to appoint to Committees and outside bodies.

Meeting dates

We have agreed to change the dates of our meetings to the 2nd Wednesday of the month. One agreed exception is the July meeting which will be Monday 3rd July. As the Hall is unavailable for the September, October and November dates these will be agreed next month.

Ordinary full council meeting.

The following matters had been raised with Councillors since the last meeting:

A member of the public raised the accessibility problems presented for people choosing not to subscribe to the garden waste refuse service and using the Ivybridge Recycling Centre. We will take this matter to DCC Cllr Dan Thomas and request if it is possible for more assistance to be made available for people lifting waste or for hoists to be installed.

We were reminded that the annual wash of the Bittaford bus stop Perspex is due, and the clerk will organise this.

The issue of silt build-up and flooding under the Bittaford viaduct was raised and Cllr Nelson and the Clerk will contact Great Western Railways and request their assistance with the matter.

Bittaford – Ivybridge Cycleway

We were sorry to receive apologies from Graham Wilson (PL21), but Cllr Holway gave a brief introduction to the project. Letters of support for the grant funding bid to the GWR Community Improvement Fund had been received from DCC and SHDC and PL21 requested a letter of support from us. We support the project in principal and the grant funding bid and look forward to learning further details of the scheme and consultation arrangements. We hope that Graham will be able to attend the June meeting. Part of our discussions were regarding the speed along the B3213, and we will be writing to DCC to present our support for a 20mph road scheme throughout Devon

Report from DCC Councillor Dan Thomas

We had received apologies from Devon County Councillor Thomas. He had sent details of grants and funding opportunities to ease the cost-of-living crises. Anyone can sign up to receive the online DCC funding newsletter.

Report from SHDC Councillors Vic Abbott and Alison Dewynter

Cllr Abbot had sent his apologies and Cllr Slater welcomed Cllr Dewynter to her first UPC meeting. Their report is available on our website.

Planning

We reviewed the following planning applications:

a) 0061/23/FUL Conversion of a silage pit into a general-purpose agricultural barn with new roof over Higher Bowcombe Farm - No comment

b) 0885/23/CLE Certificate of lawfulness for existing use of land for residential use and siting of caravan on land behind stables Higher Witchcombe Farm Ugborough Ivybridge PL21 OHR. We have no evidence to prove or disprove that the site of the mobile home has been used continuously for residential purposes and have requested monitoring by South Hams District Council Planning Team and confirmation from them that the mobile home is a permanent structure and not a caravan.

c) 1414/23/FUL Erection of 4 detached dwellings with shared drive Land At Sx 653 560 Davids Lane Filham – Support

Finance

We have agreed to purchase a Coronation memorial plaque to match the 2 in place on the Conduit and to purchase duplicate Vehicle Activated Speed camera parts to simplify moving the

camera between 2 locations as and when required. We hope that this will contribute to our efforts to reduce speeding along the Bittaford Road and, in particular, the problems with exiting Beacon View onto that road. We are pleased to give grant funding of £150 for the Ugborough Planters

Climate Emergency and sustainable Ugborough

Representatives of the Council have recently met with G-UP to look at joint working and we discussed various positive works in progress.

Erme water quality project – ClIrs May and Hosking have recently attended a meeting held for local parish councils and the draft minutes for that meeting are available on our website. There are various groups in the locality and this group focusses on the role that the local councils can most usefully play in developing a campaign to protect and manage the health of the River Erme. There is a River Erme Water Quality workshop open to all on Monday 22nd May at 7.30pm in The Watermark.

Cllr Johns has removed the dead tree in Ugborough Square and will be doing further tidying up work. We will be making a decision on its replacement at the June meeting.

Council Assets

Bittaford Play Park – The new nest swing is partly in place, Cllr Hart will be chasing up the installation of the new accessible picnic bench and the new gate needs some remedial work. We will be establishing a working group to do the tidying up work at the end of these works. If you are interested in helping out, please contact the clerk.

Highways & Rights of Way

Kitterford Roundabout Safety Report – We are disappointed that the designer has disagreed with virtually all of the safety issues raised, and Cllr Hosking and the Clerk will liaise to put together a response to the design team questioning their responses to the issues raised.

Congratulations to Cllr Johns who has passed his chapter 8 training. He is now qualified to do the necessary work for road closures.

School Field




